HYNES, BEATEN BY JOYCE, SHOWS HE IS A RUNNER

Before 20,000 Persons the "Pride of Galway" Demonstrates that He Can Make It Interesting for the Fastest Men in America.

Twenty thousand enthusiastic sons and daughters of Erin crowded and jammed Celtic Park yesterday as its confines never had been taxed before. They made the journey specially to witness the debut of Tom Hynes, the "Pride of Galway," as a runner in this country.

Not in years has so close and so game a race been witnessed. In point of interest it was one of the best races ever seen anywhere. It did not settle the question of supremacy between the two men, as it was evident to all that with a couple of weeks to get into condition Hynes would have run a better race.

Ernie Hjertberg, the coach who sent the victorious Irish team against the New York Athletic Club on Saturday at the Travers Island games, says Hynes is the likeliest runner he ever saw, and that if he changes his stride to conform to conditions of track running, to which he is at present unused, he will make an unbeatable champion.

Hynes certainly carried the hopes of the racing men, and there was no need to be satisfied of him since he was through. Considering the fact that heretofore his running has been on any old kind of ground, across country and on roads and not over a track, his performance was better than athletes expected.

Joyce was in the pink of condition, and while Hynes' debut is not to be remembered that only a week ago he arrived in New York, and for two days had been training, it is clear that if any chance of exercise beyond a walk or a deck when the weather was fine.
