RACE TRACK, SHEEPSHEAD BAY, June 15.—Thirty-five thousand people saw Beldame, queen of the American turf, win the twenty-second Suburban at Sheepshead Bay this afternoon.

The immense grand stand stretching for an eighth of a mile, was black with people. The outlines of the field stand were almost obliterated by the swarm of spectators who occupied every point of vantage over in the infield, the crowd stood hundreds deep against the rail, while hundreds of others ran across the green carpets the thoroughbreds raced on to the finish.

From the sick bodies dripped small streams of blood where the vicious spurs had dug into and torn the flesh. Their eyeballs were distended, their nostrils dilated until the blood seemed about to burst from the delicate veins.

They were forced on and on; the multitude, savage as the Spaniards around the bull ring, urged them on, with no thought that the poor brutes were leg weary and exhausted.

Beldame Takes the Lead. "Delhi wins!" roared the crowd as the racers swung into the stretch.

Then the whips sang and the spurs stung and out into the lead moved Beldame. The women shrieked in ecstasy. Then Proper came out of the bunch and started after the mare.

On they came, never faltering, straining every muscle and nerve like a team around the panting thoroughbreds. The happy rider weighed in, followed by his disappointed fellows, and as he stepped off the rees a hundred hands seized him and lifted him to strong shoulders and from that victorious way the jockey was borne back to the paddock.

The Parade to the Post. The horses came on parade at 4:10 P. M. delightfully mired by the assembled thousands.
