

THREE KILLED IN CRASHES OF AUTOMOBILES

Deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Sayce Followed by that of W. B. Woodbridge.

FIVE OTHERS INJURED.

One Machine Struck by a Train and the Other Smashed Against Stone Wall.

BOTH ACCIDENTS AT NIGHT.

Herbert Wolfe, One of the Victims, Has Fractured Skull—Boys Badly Hurt.

(Special to The Evening World.) LYNN, Mass., June 15.—William Butler Woodbridge, a prominent Boston business man, was killed in an automobile accident in Saugus early today and S. Herbert Wolfe, of New York, was seriously injured.

FIVE DAYS' RECORD OF AUTO ACCIDENTS.

SATURDAY, JUNE 10. Three persons were drowned and one was seriously injured by an automobile plunging through a drawbridge into the river in Chicago.

John H. Holmes, editor-in-chief of the Boston Herald, sustained a fracture of the collar-bone in an automobile accident on Commonwealth avenue, Boston.

An automobile owned by William N. Barnum, a lawyer, of No. 25 Broad street, ran into a light wagon on the Pelham Bridge across Hutehinson Creek and flung the occupants of the wagon out. They were Mr. and Mrs. L. Vinton, of No. 219 Franklin street, Mount Vernon, Mr. Vinton escaped uninjured, but his wife's right shoulder was sprained.

Mrs. Abbie G. Lawton dies from injuries received in runaway accident caused by automobile frightening her horse.

TUESDAY, JUNE 12. Edward Doyle, an inspector in the Department of Sewers in the Queens, was killed in Long Island City. He was driving in a light service wagon when an automobile's engine made such a noise that the horse became frightened and ran away, throwing Doyle to the pavements.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard S. Sayce, of New York and Englewood, N. J., killed; Richard, Jr., and Ray, their children, badly injured, in auto and train collision near Goshen, N. Y.

rently impossible to make this turn. As a result the machine went up the incline, struck a stone wall and a barbed wire fence, went over an embankment and turned over twice.

It was a heavy touring car, and as the machine landed upon Woodbridge and Wolfe, who occupied the back seat, the life was instantly crushed out of Woodbridge and Wolfe's skull was fractured.

Mr. Woodbridge was vice-president of the Columbian National Life Insurance Company of Boston, and also director of assets.

He was a Princeton college graduate, and during his course was prominent as a long distance runner and as captain of the track team.

Mr. Wolfe is an attorney well known in New York. He was here in connection with business matters of the Columbia National Life Insurance Company.

The body of Woodbridge was removed to the undertaking place of Mr. Bieby, at Cliffondale, by a relief party. His condition is critical. The automobile was owned by Mr. Childs.

William Butler Woodbridge was known in this city through his connection with the Columbian National Life Insurance Company, of which he was vice-president. He was formerly in business in Chicago. S. Herbert Wolfe, who was with Mr. Woodbridge and who was seriously hurt, is a consulting

attorney of this city, with offices at No. 25 Nassau street.

R. S. SAYER AND WIFE KILLED; BOYS HURT

The bodies of Richard S. Sayer, President of the Rider Engine Company, and his wife, who were killed in their automobile by an Erie Railroad freight train near Goshen last night, were brought to their home at Englewood today.

The 35-year-old Ray Sayer, who was dangerously injured, and Richard, nine years old, but not so seriously, lie still in the Thrall Hospital, Middletown. The physicians fear Ray cannot recover as his body was frightfully crushed.

The tragedy occurred at what is known as Seely's Crossing, besides Mr. and Mrs. Sayer and their two children there was a young negro chauffeur in the car. He was at the lever when the auto was run across the tracks in the very path of a flying freight train. He was thrown out in the collision, but was only slightly hurt.

The Sayers were on their way to their summer home in Warwick, Ulster County. They intended to stop over night in Goshen at the home of Mr. Sayer's brother-in-law, Joseph B. Coste.

LAWRENCE IRWIN MISSING.

The police of the East Thirty-fifth street station have been asked to find Lawrence Irwin, fourteen years old, who has been missing since June 10.

He is described as having black hair, blue eyes, wearing dark gray clothing and button shoes. The address of his parents is not given.

ARCANUM MEN MAY APPEAL TO THE COURTS

Dissatisfaction Over New Rate May Result in Action by Several Members to Restrain Collection of Assessments.

The dissatisfaction among members of the Royal Arcanum over the adoption of the new rate will result, so it was asserted today, in an action to restrain the collection of assessments under the new schedule.

It was stated upon good authority that the preliminary step toward the court proceedings would be taken by members of De Witt Clinton Council, the largest council of the order in Brooklyn. They will apply, it is said, to a Justice of the Supreme Court in Brooklyn for an injunction restraining the collector of the council from enforcing the payment of assessments under the new rate.

As this rate applies to members admitted on and after July 1, it is possible that the aid of the law will be invoked in the case of a new member.

The new rates as applying to old members will go into effect Oct. 1.

Officers Won't Talk.

Although an Evening World reporter saw a half dozen Royal Arcanum officers yesterday, men supposed to have the business of the order at their fingers' ends, not one would give any reasonable explanation as to the cause of the increased rates.

Supreme Regent Howard C. Wiggins, whose reception at the meeting of New York Council Tuesday night was somewhat of a surprise to him, returned to Rome, N. Y., yesterday. He refused to talk about the business of the Royal Arcanum for publication.

William McConnell, a representative of the Supreme Council from this city, when seen at the Board of Trade and Transportation office, at No. 338 Broadway, said he was too busy to enter into any details as to the cause for the increase.

"I am perfectly sick and tired of explaining," he said, "as you must excuse me."

Officers who wore an Arcanum button on the lapel of his coat and who was in the street, volunteered, "This is the whole thing in a nutshell. The estimated death claims for 1905 amount to about \$200,000. The receipts would amount to approximately \$700,000 under the old system. That would leave a deficit of \$500,000. The new system was adopted to overcome this deficiency."

Old Men's Burden.

"But why should the old men be made to bear the burden of the increase?" the reporter asked.

"Because," was the reply, "the young members have for years been carrying the old men. The old men, that is past fifty-five, paid in about \$100 last year, while the younger men paid in millions."

DEAD SURE SHOT IS THE MAYOR

More honors reached Mayor McClellan today. While he was receiving congratulations on his new doctor's degree and hood, a delegation of German-Americans brought him a silver loving cup and gilt crown. They were gifts from the Brooklyn Eastern District Schuetzen Corps.

The corps is holding its annual shooting festival at Glendale. According to precedent the opening of the shoot consists in firing three complimentary shots at a big wooden bird kite. The first shot is called the President's, the second the Governor's and the third the Mayor's. It was the third that hit the target yesterday, and the prize, a gilt crown, was declared to belong to the Mayor.
