

SUIT AGAINST COUNT REGGY'S FORMER WIFE

Husband of Victor Newcomb's Daughter Demands \$5,500 a Year from Her.

SHE CHARGES FRAUD.

Mrs. N. G. Ingraham Avers that Ante-Nuptial Bond Was Obtained by Dishonesty.

The suit instituted in Edinburgh, Scotland, by Nathaniel Gibbs Ingraham, formerly of New York, against his wife, who is the daughter of the late H. Victor Newcomb, New York, adds to the list of local matrimonial cases.

The marriage ceremony was performed in the residence of Dr. Johnson by the Rev. Arthur B. Howard, rector of the Church of St. John the Evangelist.

There was no opposition to the suit for the annulment of the marriage. Young Hazard was represented by Leberecht H. Garretson, his guardian ad litem.

ALIEN BILL PASSES THE BRITISH COMMONS. Balfour Says Restrictions Are Not as Severe as America's on Immigrants.

LONDON, July 20.—In the House of Commons the Aliens bill has passed its third reading by a majority of 80.

It shuts out immigrants unable to keep themselves decently, the insane, all likely to become a charge on the taxpayers, those who have been sentenced abroad for an extradition crime or been previously expelled from Britain.

It provides that an alien shall not be barred out on account of want of money if he can prove he is seeking to avoid persecution for political offenses.

The restrictions are less severe than those imposed by any other nation. Will any one assert that the Americans are indifferent to freedom or look with unmoved eye on the suffering and the oppressed? Yet their restrictions, as well as the restrictions imposed by the British colonies, are more severe than those imposed by this moderate and reasonable bill.

Young Hazard on Dec. 9, 1902, married Margaret D. Johnson, then not quite twenty, a daughter of Dr. Samuel M. Johnson, of No. 61 West Ninth street.

Hazard resides at No. 44 West Ninth street. He and his bride had been playmates. They never lived together. The bride remained in the house of her father, while Hazard went to his own home.

The marriage ceremony was performed in the residence of Dr. Johnson by the Rev. Arthur B. Howard, rector of the Church of St. John the Evangelist.

Ingraham made the unusual charge that his wife, who was divorced from Reginald Henshaw Ward, known as "Count Reggie," proposed marriage to him, and he made her his wife to please her. The papers in his suit form a remarkable document.

In her answer Mrs. Ingraham declares that Ingraham got the ante-nuptial contract and bond from her by fraud, and that he separated her from her first husband by various malicious devices, such as fortune-telling. She avers that he induced her to divorce Ward, and also induced Ward to permit himself to be sued.

Ante-Nuptial Agreement. She divorced Ward in May, 1902, and in September of that year she married Ingraham, her mother, Mrs. Victor Newcomb, and her aunt, Mrs. Danforth, of Louisville, being present at the ceremony in Folkestone, England.

Mrs. Ingraham declares that Ingraham made her sign the ante-nuptial agreement just before the marriage.

The Newcombs lived in Louisville, and were rated the wealthiest family in the South prior to the civil war. Victor Newcomb's mother became insane suddenly when he was a small child.

She hurried all of her children out of the window of their home, located in Broadway, between First and Second streets, at the time the handsomest residence south of the Mason and Dixon line, and every child was killed, with the exception of Victor.

Mrs. Newcomb was sent to an asylum, where she died some years later. Victor Newcomb, while escaping death, did not escape the strange fate that hovered over the Newcomb family. Then came his daughter, and the Newcomb family troubles have fallen to her.

Count Had "Understanding." The day Ingraham married the former Mrs. Ward it chanced that "Count Reggie" was at the Waldorf-Astoria, on his way West, to inspect some copper mines.
