GIANTS BEAT OUT CINCINNATI

KAISER TELLS CZAR TO END WAR AND HELP HIS PEOPLE

It Is Reported Unofficially that the Kaiser Suggested Immediate Peace and the Carrying Out of Many Reforms in Russia to Make the Present Dynasty Secure.

BERLIN, July 24.—Emperor William of Germany and the Czar of Russia met on their imperial yachts to-day and last night in the Gulf of Finland for a conference on matters affecting the interests of both.

Emperor William, on the royal yacht Hohenzollern, arrived first at the rendezvous off the Swedish coast last night.

When the Polar Star was anchored Emperor William went aboard her from the Hohenzollern and greeted the Czar.

The conference closed to-day with a luncheon on board the Hohenzollern, which the Czar and his suite attended.

Undoubtedly this meeting will have great influence upon the Japanese-Russian peace negotiations soon to be begun at Portsmouth, N. H., in the United States, but what direction the influence will take is the

DESPONDENT AND ILL, SHOT HIMSELF.

Arthur F. Mount, aged forty-five, superintendent of the Arthur Building at No. 41 Broadway and who lived with his wife and three children at Bayville, L. I., attempted suicide to-day by shooting himself in the head while in the lobby of the Metropolitan Hotel.
