

BETWEEN THE ROUNDS

Jimmy Britt, the lightweight champion, of California, added \$3,000 more to his bank roll as a result of his victory over "Kid" Sullivan in their twenty-round bout in Frisco last week. The total receipts of the fight amounted to \$8,797 and as the fighters fought for 60 per cent. of this money on the basis of 50 per cent. to the winner and 40 to the loser, Britt therefore was handed \$3,134.52 while Sullivan, for taking the beating got \$2,069.88. The club officials took the remainder of the money, \$4,232.50.

Fighters Want Grte Receipts.

The fight promoters of Skagway, Alaska, who are pulling off the second fight in that section between "Philadelphus Jack" O'Brien and Jack "Twin" Sullivan, billed for Aug. 8, came very near losing the match. They offered the fighters a guaranteed purse of \$5,000 with no option of a percentage of the gate receipts. Both fighters refused to sign the articles unless they were allowed to fight on a percentage basis. As the fighters threatened to call off the fight promoters save in, and will let them fight for 60 per cent.
