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GIANTS IN A BATTLE OF BATS

25 ARE KILLED IN RUINS OF BIG DRY GOODS SHOP

John G. Myers Building Collapses by the Removal of Iron Girder While 300 Clerks and Customers Are on the Various Floors.

ALBANY, Aug. 8.—In the collapse of the big department store of the John G. Myers Estate here to-day five persons are known to have lost their lives, seventy-five women and girls have been taken out of the ruins unconscious, some so badly injured that they will probably die, and thirty-five others are still in the ruins.

Several hours after the first accident there was a second, in which many persons narrowly escaped with their lives.

Among those who went down with the building is Robert M. Chalmers, a member of the firm, who was talking with a clerk when the floor dropped from beneath him.

Thirty laborers who were supposed to be buried in the ruins have been accounted for. This brings the total of missing down to thirty-five.

FASTEST BOAT, AT FULL SPEED, TURNS TURTLE
