

ROOSEVELT AND ROSEN TALK PEACE.

President Officially Announces Baron's Visit to Oyster Bay. GOES AT HIS REQUEST.

Invitation Sent After Mr. Roosevelt Had Interview with Japan's Representative.

OYSTER BAY, Aug. 19.—It was announced this afternoon by President Roosevelt that Baron Rosen, Russian Ambassador to the United States and second Russian plenipotentiary to the peace conference, would arrive in Oyster Bay later in the day for a conference with him at Sagamore Hill.

ROSEN NEARING PRESIDENT'S HOME.

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., Aug. 19.—Baron Rosen, Russian Ambassador to the United States, and Mr. Writts, associate as a peace envoy, reached New Rochelle this afternoon. He at once boarded the navy yacht Syph and was taken to the residence of the President.

TOKIO SEEMS NOT TO EXPECT PEACE.

TOKIO, Aug. 19.—It is confidently expected here that the peace conference at Portsmouth, N. H., will result in a rupture, but this news is calmly received.

Bouguereau Dying.

LA ROCHELLE, France, Aug. 19.—The painter, Adolphe William Bouguereau, is dying of old age, aggravated by the shock to his nervous system of a burglary at his residence in Paris. He is eighty years old.

Clergyman Drowned.

WEST DENNIS, Mass., Aug. 19.—The body of Rev. Norman North Bishop, a Baptist clergyman, was found today floating face downward in a shallow lagoon near here. It is thought he was struck by vertigo and fell into the lagoon.

Burned in a Hotel.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 19.—Fire today destroyed the Stateroom Inn, one block from the entrance of the Exposition. The men were burned to death and four women and two men injured.

Fire on a Cruiser.

PLYMOUTH, England, Aug. 19.—Fire was discovered today in the hold of the Brazilian cruiser Benjamin Constant, but it was extinguished after two hours.

Drank Laudanum.

POLLIM SKINNER, thirty years old, an engineer whose home was No. 117 West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, drank which hazel and laudanum mixture, and died of a sudden, at the age of twenty and was taken to the J. Hood Wright Hospital in a serious condition.

PARIS, Aug. 19.—The Detective Department today gave up the search for Emory, of Massachusetts, who mysteriously disappeared July 21 after having received a large remittance.

The Cunard line steamer Slavonia, from Palermo, was in communication by wireless telegraph with the station at Salsomaggiore, and will probably reach her dock early tomorrow.

BELIEVE WOMAN LURED VICTIM TO HIS MURDER

One Theory of Police in Case of Man Found Stabbed in Wood.

The Mafia is held responsible by Detective Sergeant Petrosini for the death of the unknown young Italian whose body was found in Van Cortlandt Park yesterday. The police believe that the man was lured to his death by a woman.

Robbery Not the Motive.

Robbery was not the cause of the man's death, for \$2 was found in his clothes to-day, in addition to the \$118 found yesterday. All details in the murder point to the man's being lured to the spot rather than his being stabbed by a man.

Saw Wounded Man.

That the man is probably the victim of a vendetta or the Mafia is borne out by the testimony of Policeman Johnson, of the Kingsbridge station, who said that he had seen a man resembling the dead man at the Kingsbridge station, nine years old, nephew of the actress Pauline Hill, told the police that he had seen the man yesterday afternoon being carried to a hospital in a wheelbarrow.
