MOTHER MAY LOSE HER HOME, GIRL HER VISION

Misfortunes Piling Up Fast on the Family of Mrs. Sophie Metz.

WARNING OF EVICTION.

But Worst of All There Is No Money for Operation on Daughter's Eyes.

Gathering her three little ones about her in her barren home of two rooms, stripped to raise money for food, Mrs. Sophie Metz, on the top floor of a rear tenement at No. 463 Water street, today told the pitiful story of her woes, the greatest of which was the blinding, perhaps for life, of her twelve-year-old daughter Sophie, and almost the least of which was the expected visit of the Marshal to turn her out into the street.

Ceiling Fell Upon Her.

"Poor little Sophie was sitting right there in a chair waiting while I got Freddie, her little four-year-old brother, ready so she could take him to Corleons Park to play on the grass," she began. "It was on July 9, and all of a sudden down came the ceiling on that side of the room. Sophie put her hands over her eyes and screamed. I forgot the pain in my shoulder where the plaster struck me and ran downstairs with her. My neighbors said to bathe her eyes, full of the plaster and lime, with cold water. I did so, but it did no good and I took her to Gouverneur Hospital. There they told me to take her to St. Vincent's Hospital. At that place they said I must have \$12 for an operation and Sophie's stay in the hospital."

"I had a penny, and had to bring Sophie home. I kept cold water bandages on her eyes, and my mother-in-law in Brooklyn sent Dr. Knapp to me. He says Sophie may recover her sight, but an operation must be performed—and that costs money, which I have not got."

QUEEN MARGHERITA VICTIM OF PLOTTERS

Mother of Italy's King Flung from Auto Which Crashed into Stone Barrier Placed Across Road at Foot of Hill—Two Suspects Arrested.

TURIN, Aug. 21.—A dastardly attempt to assassinate the Dowager Queen Margherita by wrecking her automobile is reported from Aosta.

The Queen mother, who is touring the Alps in an automobile, was ascending the Little St. Bernard, accompanied by the Marquis de Villamarina and two gentlemen. Sunday afternoon, when the machine struck against a stone barrier which had been erected in the middle of the road and overturned. The five occupants of the automobile were thrown out into the road, but none sustained serious hurts.

Police followed the royal touring car and made an immediate investigation and discovered that the barricade had been erected with the evident design to bring about a fatal accident. It had been placed at a short and dangerous turn at the foot of a declivity, where it was impossible to see the road more than a few feet in advance.

Two Suspects Arrested.

Knowledge that the Queen and her party would pass over the road during the afternoon was general throughout the countryside, and the presence of the barricade made the conclusion inevitable that it was the work of would-be assassins.

Two persons have been arrested on suspicion.

Queen Margherita telegraphed news of the accident from Aosta to her son, King Victor Emmanuel, who is at the Palace of Racconigi, near here. He at once notified the police authorities at home, and a number of secret police have been sent to Aosta.

Motive is Mysterious.

Why an attempt should have been made on the life of the Dowager Queen is puzzling. She has been idolized by the Italian people and since her husband's assassination by the Anarchists lived she has devoted her life to works of charity and piety.

She is extremely demopragic, going about in her automobile at all times and in all places without attendants. Her sole diversion has been automobilizing.

A short time ago Queen Margherita announced her intention of visiting the United States. It is thought that if investigation proves that the attempt upon her life was the work of Anarchists she may change her mind, as it was in America the assassination of her husband, King Humbert, was planned, and that of Paterson, N. J., Gaetano Bresci and three companions came on the journey that ended in King Humbert's death.

FLORENCE CROKER IS A DUCHESS

Daughter of Ex-Tammany Chief Did Not Marry a Count, but a Man of Much Higher Rank in Italy.

According to Secretary G. R. Schroeder, of the Italian Chamber of Commerce, Florence Croker has married a duke and not a count, and a very good duke at that.

The Count San Martino, who is reported to be the husband of Florence Croker's daughter, said Mr. Schroeder today, "is a personal friend of mine, who was in this country last in 1896. He left to go to Monte Carlo. He and his family all come from Turin in the northern part of Italy, and Mr. Croker has announced that his son-in-law comes from Naples. Mr. Croker ought to be as good as well as his son-in-law's Christian name. He says Luigi is his Christian name. That is not Count San Martino's name."

"Another fact in the statement of Mr. Croker that points away from the count is the statement that his son-in-law's mother was an American and that the young man is twenty-five years old. The count is thirty-two or thirty-three and his mother was an Italian."

"Now, I am from Naples, and I know the Duke San Martino. His name is Luigi and his mother was an American. A Miss Haight. He is twenty-four or twenty-five years old, good-looking and well-dressed. His family is very old. While he and the count are probably
