

**GIRL DECLARES MRS. MORGAN TOLD HER LIFE'S STORY**

Tallies with That of Adventuress Who Swindled Many, She Says.

**YOUNG WILL INQUIRE.**

Wife Who Shot Stenographer Links Her Victim with Notorious Woman.

Nearly two weeks before the shooting of Mrs. Kathleen Morgan by Mrs. William G. Young, which occurred in the Hotel Imperial last Saturday, Mrs. Morgan told a young woman employee of the Marthia Washington Hotel, where she lives, a story of her life identical with that of the Mrs. Isabel Morgan Perkins, formerly a society woman of Springfield, Mass., whose photograph has been identified as that of Mrs. Morgan.

From time to time after that, according to the young woman employed in the hotel, Mrs. Morgan took her into her confidence.

"I was reading my Testament in the hotel one day," said the girl to-day, "when Mrs. Morgan came to me and told me that she had once been a Sunday school girl and had later taught a class. She added that she had gone wrong and her whole life had been ruined. Her marriage had been unhappy, she declared, and she got too fond of a good time. Then she told me a long story about herself that tallies with that in The Evening World to-day, given as the record of Mrs. Perkins.

"About a week before the shooting she confided to me that Mrs. Young had called on her and gone on her knees to her. She told me she had said she could no longer trust her husband, as he had repeatedly broken his promise to see no more of her, and that she had finally come to Mrs. Morgan herself, in spite of the shame of it, to beg her not to take her husband away.

"Mrs. Morgan told me that she had promised to keep away from Mr. Young. She said furthermore that she meant to keep her promise and she went out and joined the Episcopal Church again. I believe she was faithfully keeping it when she was shot."

Mrs. Young saw the picture of Mrs. Perkins in the Jefferson Market Prison to-day and identified it to her own satisfaction as that of Mrs. Morgan.

Her husband saw the picture at the Grand Hotel and was also struck by the resemblance. He has been one of the staunch supporters of Mrs. Morgan's reputation. But to an Evening World reporter he said:

"The resemblance is certainly striking, but I cannot help believing it is a case of mistaken identity. However, you may be very sure I'll find out. I know nothing of Mrs. Morgan's antecedents, but I do know she is a first-class stenographer and typewriter and she always done her work. A woman with a past can be as good a workwoman as she without."

"As for my wife, she is insane. I shall prove it to the satisfaction of the Court at the proper time."

Isabel Morgan Perkins is an adventuress with a remarkable record. She was born in Bennington, Vt. Her father was a physician in good circumstances and she was splendidly educated. After his death the girl and her mother moved to Springfield, where they moved in the best social circles. Miss Morgan was a teacher in the Bible class of the North Congregational Church when she married Stephen Perkins, a wealthy young man of Chicopee, Mass.

Her husband some time after the marriage began to suspect his wife and hired Detective Dexter A. Adams, of the Springfield police, to shadow her while she went to New York ostensibly to make arrangements for a projected trip abroad.

Mrs. Perkins was not long in New York before Mr. Perkins received a wire from the detective telling him his wife had met Fred Wright, a wealthy Springfield contractor, and was registered with him at the Hotel Roland. Perkins hurried to New York and tried to kick down the door and get at his wife and her companion. He was restrained, and returned to Springfield and instituted divorce proceedings. His wife did not contest.

After the decree was granted Mrs. Morgan Perkins began her career as an adventuress, and her victims, most of them prominent men, are declared to have been many.
