It was her mother love that unmoved her and made her faint just when she might have followed a clue that would have led her to her lost girl.

In the winter of 1896 Rosie, nearly five years old, was playing on the street in front of her home, which was then No. 8 Willett street, when a man, described to the mother as "very tall and very dark," crept up behind her and placing his hand over her mouth to stifle her screams, seized her and ran down the street.

The police made efforts for days to get some clue to the kidnapper, but to no avail. Mrs. Cohen's husband had died only a short time before, and the slight loss of her child was a crushing blow.

It is a word had the heartbroken mother heard of her daughter until yesterday. She was busy with her housework about 10 o'clock in the morning when there was a knock on the door. Her flat is on the third floor. Opening the door, Mrs. Cohen was confronted by a very tall and very dark man.
