

### FAIR INVENTOR IN COURT FIGHT OVER SKIRT GRIP

Gave Up Singing Engagement  
to Put Idea on Market,  
Now Sues Agent.

Miss Malle Little, a soprano singer, seven or eight years ago, gave up her singing engagement in New Orleans at \$150 a week to engage in the manufacture and sale of her fortune-making idea.

Now she is suing Christopher W. Youngman, of No. 42 Broadway, for an injunction, first to restrain him from assigning her contract with him, under which he was to finance the manufacture of the skirt grip; second to cancel the contract on the ground that it did not contain all the things he promised in the talk preceding the drawing of the document third to cancel an accounting which he made to her, by which he seemed to owe her \$148.42, when by her understanding he ought to pay her \$1,000 in royalties, and \$700 in salary at \$5 a week for her work as a demonstrator and saleswoman in one of the big department stores.

She also demands that the exclusive right to make or sell the invention be assigned to her, and that Youngman be compelled to make an accounting.

The matter was brought before Justice Traub, in the Supreme Court, today, the paper including several affidavits by the singer's inventor, who is known in private life as Mrs. Louis Pritzkow, and lives at No. 1545 Forty-sixth street, Brooklyn.

Other affidavits were made by Georgiana Kirk, Youngman's former seventeen-year-old stenographer, of No. 67 Bedford avenue, Brooklyn; Louise Ederle, another of sixteen summer, who lives at No. 11 Montgomery street, Brooklyn; Capt. Alfred O. Girard, late of Roosevelt's Rough Riders, and now of No. 802 Church avenue, Brooklyn as others.

The photograph of the soprano was to be the trade-mark of the enterprise, and many illustrated copies were alluded to in the papers.

Decision was reserved.
