

JAPS PASS TREATY; READY NOW TO RATIFY

After Decisive Action in Tokio, Ministers of Mikado and Czar Meet in Washington

EXCHANGE PRISONERS.

Japan Accepts Russia's Proposition and Her Troops Will Be Delivered at Frontier.

TOKIO, Oct. 4.—The peace treaty passed the privy council to-day. The session of the council lasted several hours and it is reported, the opponent of the treaty made a vigorous fight against its ratification. Final action on the agreement will follow immediately.

An order abrogating martial law at Sasebo, Nagasaki, Fushushima and Hakodate was passed by the Privy Council to-day.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Diplomatic relations between Russia and Japan were resumed at the State Department for a short time to-day, while Baron Rosen, the Russian Ambassador, and Mr. Takahira, the Japanese Minister, discussed the forms of ratification of their respective countries.

The call was made by appointment at the request of Mr. Takahira, who desired to see the Russian form of ratification. Accordingly, Secretary Root sent Mr. Smith, chief of the diplomatic bureau of the State Department, who brought to the diplomatic room a copy of a Russian ratification treaty, which gave Mr. Takahira the information he desired.

The envoys remained for a few minutes in conversation with Secretary Root, and then left the department without further exchanges.

It would seem certain from this that ratifications of the peace treaty are to be exchanged at Washington.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 4.—Russia to-day agreed to the Japanese proposition to exchange prisoners of war, whereby 1,800 Japanese prisoners in Russia will be delivered at some point on the western frontier of Russia and 6,000 Russians will be delivered at the ports of Kobe, Nagasaki and Yokohama, whence they will be conveyed to Vladivostok in ten Russian transports, not infested at Shanghai and Saigon, and two or three other ships which are being sent from Odessa.

The American Charge d'Affaires, Spencer Eddy, is endeavoring to make special and more speedy arrangements for the release of the sick Japanese, for which it is hoped Japan may send a ship direct to the Baltic.

HENDRICK FOR SUPREME COURT

Former Partner of Justice O'Brien Urged for Place by Members of the Bar and Many District Leaders.

One of the prominent candidates for a Supreme Court judgeship is Peter A. Hendrick. He is forty-eight years old, was educated in the public schools and Fordham University.

He began the practice of law at Auburn, and was elected Corporation Counsel of that city, being the first Democrat to hold that office in forty years. He is backed in his candidacy for the Supreme Court by Mr. H. H. Hendrick, leader of the Thirty-first Assembly District.

He came to New York to engage in business with Morgan J. O'Brien, now presiding Justice of the Appellate Division. He has been constantly in the active practice of his profession and has been connected with many of the most important litigations in the local courts and in the Court of Appeals.

For the last few years he has been engaged exclusively as counsel to other attorneys in trying cases and arguing appeals and his standing at the bar is of the highest.

He is a member of one of the most prominent and influential law firms in the country. One brother, Hiram Rev. T. A. Hendrick, was Rector of the University of the State of New York, and has a national reputation for the great work done for charities of every denomination. He was one of the two representatives of the United States at the World's Charity Congress in London and was selected by the Pope as one of the American Bishops for the Philippines. He is now in Cuba. Another brother, the Very Rev. Joseph Hendrick, of Rochester, is Domestic Prelate to the Pope, with the title of Monsignor. Another brother, M. J. Hendrick, has for many years been United States Consul-General to Canada.


Mr. Hendrick is an active member of Tammany Hall, and has the good will of all the district leaders. He has the active support of many distinguished members of the bar and of a number of the Supreme Court judges, including Justice O'Brien.

CALLED OUT IN RAIN BY FALSE BURGLAR TALE

New York University Freshmen Thought It a Rare Joke on Ignatz Popper.

A mischievous prank which called the victim from his bed on a stormy night, sent him hurrying to his office on the supposition that burglars had entered it and nearly got him arrested as a suspicious character, caused the assignment to-day in Yorkville Police Court of three young freshmen of New York University, all sons of well-to-do parents. They were Herman Adelson, of No. 112 West One Hundred and Eleventh street; Benjamin Ablowitz, Van Cortlandt apartment-house, at Ninety-sixth street and Park avenue; and Jesse Levenson, Temple Court apartment, at Ninetieth street and Madison avenue.

The complainant was Ignatz Popper, a wealthy tobacco importer, who lives at No. 111 East Ninety-fifth street, and whose office and warehouses are at No. 125 Water street.

Shortly after midnight of Sept. 18 Popper said, he was awakened by the ringing of his telephone bell. It was raining hard and the night was cold and chilly. When he lifted the phone receiver a voice said:

"It is Serg. Brown, of the Old Slip station. Burglars have broken into your office in Water street. Will you come down?"

Popper, intensely excited, asked for more particulars, but the "sergeant" hung up his phone and he couldn't hear any more. While Popper was dialing the telephone bell rang again. This time a voice said to Popper:

"This is the name of a certain newspaper office. Can you tell us about the burglary in your office?"

HOTEL GOTHAM SERVES LIQUOR IN HAT BOXES

Baskets Also Used to Bring Beverages from Base of Supplies.

Though the Hotel Gotham, on Fifth-fifth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, cannot, through its proximity to the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, sell any malt or spirituous liquors, a thirst need no languish there. The proprietor has devised a very ingenious and dignified method for supplying his thirsty guests and at the same time not offending the delicate sensibilities of his neighbors.

The law that forbids the sale of intoxicants within a certain distance of a church does not prohibit a patron of a hotel so hampered by boundary from sending a messenger for whatever he may wish in the spirituous line. As the ordinary process of ringing up a messenger boy and sending him in quest of the desired beverage would occupy too much time, the hotel has organized a staff of youthful messengers who might be called the Gotham's Ganymedes.
