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HEGEMAN IS CALLED AS A WITNESS

President of Metropolitan Life Put on Stand by Prober Hughes.

MUTUAL'S PAID "NEWS."

C. J. Smith Tells About Bureau Which Sends Out \$1-a-Line Reports of Inquiry.

John R. Hegeman, president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, was suddenly called to the witness stand at the Legislative Insurance inquiry.

It was within a quarter of an hour of adjournment when Mr. Hughes, to the surprise of everyone called out, "John R. Hegeman take the stand."

With hair streaming down his back the Metropolitan's executive advanced and was sworn. Without any ado Mr. Hughes cut loose an inquiry as to what kind of business the Metropolitan Life does.

"The Metropolitan is a stock company," testified Mr. Hegeman. "Its profits go to its stockholders; not its policyholders. We do two branches of life insurance—ordinary and industrial."

He said he held an interest of \$275,000 in the stock of the company. The capitalization is \$2,000,000. Vice-President Haley Fluke is a small stockholder and Vice-President Dutcher owns 100 shares.

Mr. Hegeman testified that during the past eight years his company had given as "a matter of grace and voluntarily" \$8,000,000 to policy holders.

"This gift was in the industrial form," he explained. "It was given during times of stress, food, fire and epidemics."

WOMAN SLAIN AND BEHEADED FOUND IN RIVER

Body Discovered Late This Afternoon—Indications that the Victim Had Been Maltreated—Her Head Has Been Secreted.

The headless body of a murdered woman was found in the Bronx River near Yonkers late this afternoon.

The body was tied up in strips of sheeting. That the woman had been married was signified by a wedding ring.

The police, who report the finding of the body, declare that the woman was undoubtedly murdered. The clothing found on the body was of excellent material.

The belief is entertained that the woman was a resident of Yonkers, who was assaulted and murdered by highwaymen, who cut off and secreted the head.

PATROL WAGON HODGINS USES VIEW EMPTIES OCOBACO CLUB AXES IN RAID IN NEW PRECINCT

When Police Vehicle Stopped Before Alleged Pool-Room Patrons Fled. Smashes Way Into Alleged Pool-Room and Arrests Three on Warrants.

A patrol wagon containing twelve policemen backed up to the curb in front of No. 28 East One Hundred and Eighth street late this afternoon.

The patrol wagon was loaded with policemen and was ready to smash its way into the alleged pool-room. The policemen at the front of the wagon and grinned at the crowd, and the crowd grinned back at the policemen.

Capt. Cruise, of the East One Hundred and Fourth street station, was responsible for the attraction. Twice within the past two weeks he has raided the Ocofaco Club at the above number as a pool-room. Frank McManus and Harry Jacobs have been held for the Grand Jury, charged with running the place.

It is the only suspected pool room in the precinct and Capt. Cruise has been determined to suppress it. His idea that a patrol wagon loaded with policemen would prove effective was shown to be well grounded. About thirty men sneaked out of the building one by one and lost themselves in the crowd. Each was greeted with hoots and jeers.

"The patrol wagon treatment," said Capt. Cruise, "will drive them out of my precinct."
