

**FAMOUS IRISH SINGERS HERE**

Ladies' Choir to Arrive on Steamer Astoria for a Concert Tour.

TWENTY-SIX BEAUTIES.

Prize Winners at Dublin Annual Music Festival and at Every Other Competition Entered.

The Irish Ladies' Choir, an organization of twenty-six of the prettiest girls in Ireland, which arrives in New York this afternoon on the Anchor line steamer Astoria for a tour of the United States that will extend to the Pacific Coast, will give a private concert at the Hotel Astor on Friday evening to open the tour. The first public concert will be given at the Academy of Music next Sunday afternoon and evening.

The splendid organization holds the prize awarded at the Peis Ceil, the annual music festival of Dublin, and has gained the first prize in every competition it has entered. The members are ladies of culture and refinement, enthusiastic in their love for old Irish music and pleasantly expectant of the wonders they shall see in their tour of this country. Their concerts are to be given under the auspices of A. O. H. and Knights of Columbus lodges and Catholic societies.

The soloists are the leading artists in vocal and instrumental music, and Mrs. Confort-Heller, of Dublin, who, aside from being the conductress, will sing the soprano solos. She has a large repertoire from the works of Wagner, Gounod, Nevin, Schubert, Strauss and Kunklen, and sings in Gaelic, English, Welsh, French, Italian, German and Spanish. Miss Joan Holland, of Dublin, is the contralto, and her voice is said to be of very fine quality, and her piano solos are very pleasing.

Miss Violet Kelly, of Dublin, is acknowledged as Ireland's greatest soprano; Miss Madge Murphy, of Cookstown, who is a pupil of Sevak, has won a great reputation as a female violinist and has played throughout Europe with great success, and Miss Janie Jellie, of Carrickfergus, received the gold medal as a pianist and will surprise the music-loving world of America.

Among the repertoire will be "The Harp That Once Through Tara's Hall," "Kathleen Mavourneen," "The Wearin' of the Green," "The Shamrock," "Fusheen," "Farewell, but Whenever," "The Donovans," "Rory O'More," "Savourneen Dhealish" and "A Lament." They, however, will not confine themselves to Irish music alone, but render compositions of modern composers, as well as selections of the old masters. The ladies will be costumed in white, with green sashes worked in gold shamrock, and wear wreaths of shamrock to their hair.


