Blair Is Set Free.

William J. Blair, an inspector for the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, who was arrested a week ago on a charge of having induced two men to testify falsely in the damage suit in which the company was the defendant, was discharged this afternoon in the Tribuna Police Court by Magistrate Walsh. The Magistrate said he would not think of holding Blair on the unproved statement of the two witnesses.

Dairy Maids Acquitted.

HACKENSACK, Oct. 29.—Annie and Rachel Michaelson, cousin, pretty and each nineteen years old, of Coneyville, were acquitted today when tried for assault and battery upon Policemen Carney and Hartnett, of that place, and with resisting the officers. The girls have been referred to as the "Dairy Maids," and the trouble followed the arrest of their "cowboy," Philip Bender.

Driver's Death Suspicious.

WATERBURY, Conn., Oct. 29.—William Norton, a hack driver, from Westchester, died here today, and the police are hunting two strangers whom he had driven to a resort near Waterbury, and who drove the hack back with Norton inside in a dying condition. They said he had fallen.

Gas Supply Cut Off.

ELMHURST, Oct. 29.—The separating of a natural gas main somewhere between this city and Coudersport, Pa., has resulted in shutting off the supply of natural gas to Elmhurst, Corning and several other smaller places where hundreds depend upon it.

Run on a Savings Bank.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Oct. 29.—A run on the savings department of the Corn Belt Bank, of this city, began today, but all demands were met in full. Large sums of money have been ordered from Chicago, and local banks are ready to assist.

Postal Clerk a Suicide.

ATQUSTA, Ga., Oct. 29.—Edward C. Bearden, only order clerk in the post-office here, committed suicide today after being seized by an inspector to turn over his cash drawer and books for examination.

Foraker Stops Speeches.

COLUMBIA, Oct. 29.—Senator Foraker sent word to Republican State headquarters today that his physician had absolutely forbidden him to go out of the house and requested his dates for the rest of the campaign be cancelled.

Town Caves In.

WILKES-BARRE, Oct. 29.—A considerable portion of the main street of Lawrence sunk two feet today owing to a landslide caused by the Red Ash vein of the Redbank colliery. Many buildings were damaged.

Flammer to Aid Jerome.

It was announced this afternoon that Charles A. Flammer, who declined the nomination for District Attorney on the Republican ticket, would stump for Jerome until Election Day.

Killed Himself at 85.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 29.—Dependent because he felt he had outlived his usefulness, Capt. James G. Wright, eighty-five years old, shot himself today by shooting. He was a man of means.

WOMAN STRICKEN IN FIFTH AVENUE STAGE.

About Fifty Years Old, Weighed 250 Pounds, and Died in the New York Hospital.

A woman about fifty years old, weighing 250 pounds and bearing no marks of identification, was taken ill in the Fifth Avenue stage at Twenty-fifth Street this afternoon and was hurried to New York Hospital, where she died shortly after her reception.

PADRIANSI FIGHT DUEL IN WILD WEST STYLE.

Rival Politicians Meet on Street, Pull Guns and Blaze Away—Neither Hurt.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—Deputy Eugenio Corbelli and Carolina Serrano, an unsuccessful candidate for election in the Chamber of Deputies, had an encounter today in the streets, during which a number of shots were exchanged. Mr. Serrano fired three and Mr. Corbelli two, but without effect. They were arrested.

The encounter followed an election result.

CZAR YIELDS AND GRANTS RIGHTS TO RUSSIAN PEOPLE

Fiands Witte Imperial Mandate Giving Civil Liberty, Real Legislation, Freedom of Speech, Immunity of Person and Habeas Corpus.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 30.—6.05 P. M.—To-night the autocracy of the Romanoffs and the old order of things cease to exist in Russia.

Emperor Nicholas has surrendered and Count Witte comes into power as Minister-President with an imperial mandate which will enable him to convert the farcical National Assembly into a real legislative body, elected by greatly extended suffrage, and to confer upon the people fundamental civil liberties, including free speech.

These welcome tidings reached St. Petersburg shortly before 6 o'clock this evening. Count Witte had spent the day with the Emperor at Peterhof, going over the final draft of the manifesto to which he insisted that certain minor modifications be made, and before taking the train for St. Petersburg he telephoned to a friend that the Emperor had affixed his signature, and that the imperial mandate comprising the conditions upon which he had agreed to accept office was in his pocket.

These include freedom of the press, the right of assembly and the immunity of the person, including the right of habeas corpus.

The official announcement issued this evening says: "An imperial manifesto will be issued this evening appointing Count Witte Prime Minister, with special authority to co-ordinate and unify the powers of the different branches of the Administration. Civic liberties are granted to the Russian people and to the National Assembly is given legislative power, while the suffrage is enlarged."

Count Witte insisted on a Cabinet on the British model, with a selected Premier responsible to the Imperial Duma, or Parliament, while the Emperor clung to the appointment of the members of the Cabinet on the American plan, by the Emperor, as Chief of State.

ADMIRALS SLAIN, FLEET IN MUTINY.

CHINESE ATTACK YANKEE ADMIRAL

Son of Train Also an Officer Held by the Mob as Hostage.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—A despatch to the Evening Standard from Shanghai says that Rear-Admiral Train, commander-in-chief of the American Asiatic Squadron, and his son, Lieut. Train, have been victims of a savage attack by Chinese outside of Nanking.

GERMAN FLEET OFF FOR THE CZARINA?

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—The German cruiser Lubeck and ten torpedo-boats of the Third and Fifth divisions put to sea this morning for Kiel for an unknown destination, giving rise to a rumor that they are bound for St. Petersburg to bring the Russian Emperor and her children to the guests of Prince and Princess Henry of Prussia. No official confirmation of the report is obtainable.

MANY KILLED IN RIOTS AT RIGA.

RIGA, Russia, Oct. 29.—During the day collisions between the troops and armed populace continued. Many persons were killed or wounded. The strikers used knives and revolvers and killed a number of police with cold steel.

ONE HUNDRED FALL UNDER COSSACK FIRE

REVAL, Russia, Oct. 29.—The troops fired two volleys in a crowd in the market place today, killing or wounding over a hundred persons. Crowds of people are parading the streets singing the "Marseillaise." A mob last night destroyed the Hotel De France.

WASHINGTON TO AID AMERICANS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The danger to Americans in St. Petersburg is the present critical state of affairs is proved by the despatch from Spencer Kelly, American Charge d'Affaires at the Russian capital, in which he asks the State Department at Washington for instructions to meet any eventualities in St. Petersburg.

French Legislators Meet.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—Crowds attended the opening of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies today. The Chamber decided to take up the budget November 1.

JAMAICA RACE TRACK, N. Y., Oct. 29.

There were ideal racing conditions at Jamaica this afternoon. The air was cool and breezy and the track lightning fast. The card could scarcely be called ideal from the players point of view for the reason that three handicaps and the nineteen horse maiden race combined to give the player all the worst of it.

The stakes were the Richmond Handicap, a two-year-old, five and one-half furlongs, and the Antimony, a three-year-old, six furlongs.

Druid went to the front at the start, made all the running and won handsily by a length from Zeala, who finished strong and beat Incantation a length for the place. Lucy Young and My Buel showed speed, but both died away in the stretch.

Sam H. Harris Breezed In.

Sam H. Harris went to the front and made the running, followed by Arsenal and Bohadur. They ran in this order to the far turn, where Antimony took third place. In the run home Sam H. Harris held his own and won easily by three lengths from Antimony, who closed strong and beat Arsenal half a length for the place.

Lone Hand was Outwaded.

Lone Hand went to the front and set a hot pace, followed by Main, Redmore and Don Ponso. Lone Hand took a lead of three tenths on Main, who was the same distance in front of the favorite, Redmore. The latter steadily closed on Main and, passing him on the turn, closed on Lone Hand in the stretch.

Handzarra was Out in Front but Was Surprised.

Handzarra was out in front but was surprised by Red King, who led to the stretch, followed by Handzarra, Arsenal and Battle Strome. In the stretch Handzarra went to the front and set a lead of a half from Red King, who was a length from Race King, who was a half from Handzarra.

Battleaxe Set the Pace.

Battleaxe went to the front and made the running followed by Curly Jim and Bohadur. They ran in this order to the stretch where Curly Jim closed on Battleaxe and won by a head. Battleaxe was third a length in front of Meddling Daisy, who just got up in time to beat Third Alison for third money.

Roycroft Won Easily.

Roycroft went to the front at the start, made the running to the far turn, where Roycroft closed and passed My Buel, who was a half from T. J. Cox three lengths to title place.

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JEROME BARRED FROM REPUBLICAN BALLOT COLUMN

Elections Board by Tie Vote Refuses to Put His Name in Place of Flammer's—Party Managers to Seek Mandamus from Courts.

The Board of Elections by a vote of 2 to 2 barred the name of William Travers Jerome from the Republican column on the official ballot this afternoon. Steps were immediately taken by the Republican campaign managers to secure a writ of mandamus from the Supreme Court to compel the placing of Mr. Jerome's name on the ballot.

This move, if the present plans of Tammany are adhered to, will not be contested. But, if Mr. Jerome is elected Tammany Hall will contest the election.

MORE MONEY BET ON THE ELECTION

Odds in Favor of Jerome Advance to 10 to 8 on the Curb.

After considerable sparring for advantage the betting commissions of Wall Street began the last week of the campaign with a number of wagers that appear to establish the odds as they will stand from now until election. Mr. Jerome is the favorite over the field for District Attorney at 10 to 8, McClellan is favorite over the field at 3 to 1, and 3 to 1 was bet that Hearst will get more votes than Ivins.

The first bet of the day was a small transaction in which 10 to 8 was bet on Osborne. This condition did not apply for long. Goldfinger & Co. started the Jerome movement by betting \$500 to \$400 that he will be re-elected, a representative of Wren Bros. taking the name of T. Smith bet \$2,000 against \$1,000 on Jerome with L. M. Teichman. Alben McGraw put up by Maurice Mandelbaum against \$1,000 that McClellan will win the election.

The only way that Ivins figured in the betting was as a possible contender against Hearst in the number of votes cast, the odds against his beating Hearst in the poll being 3 to 1. H. P. May bet \$500 against \$1,500 that the Republican vote will be heavier than that of the Municipal Ownership League.

The biggest bet of the day was one of \$5,000 put up by Maurice Mandelbaum against \$1,000 that McClellan will win the election. The name of the Hearst bettor was not given. L. M. Teichman bet \$1,000 on McClellan against \$500 put up by C. R. Hammerlough. Housman & Co. bet \$4,000 against \$1,500 on McClellan against a man named Chrysal who also bet \$250 on the field against \$1,000 on McClellan with Washington Content.
