

MISSION GIRLS MUST GO BACK TO WORK

Shand Sisters, Accused of Collecting Funds, Are Released.

With the arrest and the arraignment to-day in the Essex Market Court of Agnes and Catherine Shand on the charge of running a bogus mission at No. 63 Tillary street, Brooklyn, Detectives George D. Miskok and James Forbes, of the Charitable Organization Society, have started out on a crusade against all the women who daily visit saloons and beg for funds under the guise that they are connected with some religious organization.

The Shand girls are only eighteen and nineteen years old respectively, but their case, the detectives declare, is the worst that has yet come under their observation. That the sisters made a good living not only for themselves but for the entire family out of the fake mission there is no doubt. The girls admit it themselves, and when they were arrested Catherine had \$5 in her pocketbook.

Both the girls were in the shabbiest kind of attire. Each wore black gloves with the finger tips worn through. Their gowns hardly deserved the name. The two were arrested in Manhattan while on a collecting tour on the lower east side. In the pocket of Catherine's dress the detectives found a book with the record of one week's collections. day, \$1; Tuesday, \$2.50; Wednesday, \$1; Thursday, \$2.50; Friday, \$1.25. Outside of the court both girls pleaded with Forbes and Miskok to let them go on with the mission. It was so easy that they didn't want to give it up and

go back to the old factory. Life there was nothing but hard work and little pay. The detectives told them that if they tried to work the game again they would be sent to some institution. The magistrate did not agree with the

prisoners. He insisted that they must give up the mission business and go back to work. Both girls readily consented to do so, and the Magistrate then paroled them with the understanding they should report to the detectives every month.






