### ROBBERS SENT FOR SISTER TO FREE VICTIM

Tied and Gagged Dancing Master and Looted His Rooms.

LEFT HIM HELPLESS

Then Sent Telegram to Sister Saying He Was Ill, "Come at Once."

With a soiled bath towel in his mouth for a gag and his wrists and ankles bound fast with neckties and straps, Kenneth Frothingham says he lay in his dining academy and physical culture school at Nos. 9-11 East Fifty-ninth street, last night, an enforced spectator to the operations of two well-dressed, nice-mannered youths who looted his apartment and despoiled his helpless person of trinkets and ready cash.

Mr. Frothingham is a brother of Howard P. Frothingham, of No. 2 Wall street, one of the wealthiest brokers in the financial district and said to have at command more ready cash for call loans than any other man there, except Russell Sage.

He was a prisoner for nearly an hour after the two Mr. Raffles departed. Then he released himself and went to the nearest police station, much disheveled and annoyed, and told his amazing story to the sergeant.

When he got back to his devastated quarters Frothingham found his sister there, for the robbers had kindly sent her a telegram telling her that her brother needed somebody at his rooms immediately.

Tries to Recall Men.

Frothingham is a small man, fifty-two years old. For years he has been hotel-room manager at the United States Hotel in Saratoga.

### RUSSIAN CRISIS AS MUTINEERS DEFY THE CZAR

Sevastopol Seething and Rebels There Must Give Up or Fight.

LED BY AN OFFICER

Odessa Forces Ready to Join Mutiny, and Army in Open Rebellion.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 28.—The military officers at St. Petersburg admit that no reliance can be placed on the line regiments in the capital. According to the officers the spirit of revolt pervades the whole army.

The government to-day announced that unless the mutineers at Sebastopol surrendered before midnight armed force will be used. But there is grave doubt here whether Gen. Baron Miller Gakonevich, Commander of the Sevastopol Army Corps, who is in charge of the situation, dare put the soldiers to the test of firing on their comrades.

### BOY PUPILS CALL WOMAN A FAGIN

Say Mrs. Warzi Taught Them to Steal and Bought Booty—Held for Trial.

On two charges of receiving stolen goods Antonette Wertz, of No. 426 East Thirteenth street, was held in \$2,000 bail for trial by Magistrate Pool in Yorkville Court to-day. As witnesses against her the agents of the Children's Society produced four boys twelve and thirteen years old, who confessed without apparent regret or remorse that at the instigation and instruction of the woman they had made daily thefts from storekeepers in lower First avenue.

### Venezuela Case Discussed.

PARIS, Nov. 28.—An official note issued after the meeting of the Council of Ministers to-day announced that Premier Rouvier went over the naval demonstration of the powers against Turkey and the Franco-Venezuelan controversy. This was the first Cabinet meeting to give consideration to the Venezuelan affair. The Foreign Office, however, says there is no material change in the situation.

### N. Y. LIFE MAN HELD IN BAIL FOR REBATING

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28.—Harold Pierce, the New York Life Insurance agent arrested on a charge of giving rebates on policies contrary to law, had a hearing before Magistrate Tierman late this afternoon. Grant Levis, cashier of the Philadelphia clearing-house of the company, and Benjamin C. Warnick, who took out the \$100,000 policy on which the alleged rebates were granted, were the witnesses.
