

JAMES B. DUKE AND HIS WIFE IN A JERSEY COURT

They Met To-Day for First Time Since He Sued for Divorce.

WHERE DOES DUKE LIVE?

Argument Before Vice-Chancellor to Determine Jurisdiction of Jersey Courts.

James B. Duke, the millionaire tobacco magnate, and his wife, Lillian V. Duke, met to-day in Vice-Chancellor Pitney's court, Newark, for the first time since he brought suit for absolute divorce last September, naming Capt. Frank Hutton as co-respondent. The hearing to-day before the Vice-Chancellor was to establish a question of jurisdiction to determine whether or not Mr. Duke was a resident of New Jersey and whether he could bring suit in that State as such. Vice-Chancellor Pitney's rulings at the opening of the hearing favored Duke.

Mrs. Duke was accompanied across the ferry and to the Vice-Chancellor's office by a mysterious, gray-haired man, who looked like pictures of Hutton. He left her at the door and immediately disappeared. Mrs. Duke was resident in a white-faced velvet gown, with towering hat to match, mink fur boa and mink. Her cheeks glowed with a high color, and she constantly consulted with a small bald-headed man who joined her in court. In addition to the mysterious man who had deserted her at the Vice-Chancellor's door she was accompanied by a maid, not the one who served her during the period complained of by Mr. Duke, and who is said to be in readiness to take the witness stand for her husband.

Mr. Duke was represented by Richard A. Lindabury and Alvan A. Clark, counsel for Mrs. Duke were Chauncey D. Parker and Samuel Kaftan.

Mr. Duke testified. In the hearing Mr. Duke took the stand and in answer to questions by counsel said that he was forty-nine years old, was born and brought up in Orange County, South Carolina, and that he came to New York in 1884. That he had conducted a cigarette factory at No. 8, Living-on-street from that time until 1888, when he was driven out by a fire. He then conducted a cigar business at No. 12, and later at No. 122, across adjoining. "What address did you give at that time?" asked the Vice-Chancellor.

MARINES LANDED TO FIGHT CHINESE

Foreigners Attacked by Shanghai Mobs and American Vice-Consul Wounded.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 18.—During a riot here, promoted by boycotters of an account of an incident involving the Mixed Court, the German Consul was stoned and the American Vice-Consul and several other foreigners were attacked and injured. The Chinese closed their shops when the rioting began. The local volunteers were called out to restore order and detachments of blue-jackets were landed from the warships to assist in restoring peace. The riots have been suppressed. Twenty Chinese rowdies were killed. Otherwise the damage done was slight.


