### Clamor for Farm Help.

RICHMOND, VA., JAN. 5.—Commissioner of Agriculture Kolner has been deluged with applications for farm help since the publication of his plan for procuring labor from the unemployed poor of England, Germany, Norway and Sweden.

### Alaskan Explorer Dead.

MONTREAL, JAN. 5.—Francis Morley, who gained some fame as an Alaskan explorer, died yesterday. He was sixty-eight years old. When Alaska was ceded to the United States by Russia Mercler was connected with some of the preliminary negotiations.

### Flagship Chicago Returns.

CHICAGO, ILL., JAN. 5.—The cutter Chicago, flagship of the Pacific squadron, has arrived in port after a cruise to the Hawaiian Islands. The warship will stay here until about Jan. 15, when it is expected she will cruise to Santa Barbara.

### Shot Child and Herself.

LOUISVILLE, KY., JAN. 5.—After shooting her husband good-by, Mrs. Salome Margaret Polard yesterday shot and killed her three-year-old son and then attempted suicide by shooting a bullet in the head. The woman explained her act by saying that she was being persecuted and had no care to be a parent of anybody.

### Big Orders for Cars.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Annual statistics of the car and automotive business just published show that in the twelve months just closed the railways of the country have ordered 24,515 freight cars, 116 locomotives and 3,333 passenger cars. In 1904 the railways ordered 22,500 freight cars, 100 locomotives and 3,231 passenger cars.

### Train Killed Deer.

MASSENA, N. H., JAN. 5.—As a passenger train from Boston reached the suburbs of this city to-day it struck and killed a two-year-old buck deer which was running on the track. Frank L. Kitteridge, a passenger, took the carcass as a trophy and would have done fish and game commissioner Wentworth confessed the venison for the State.

### Red Men to Roosevelt.

GRIFFIN, GA., JAN. 5.—Judge Robert Daniel will leave here Monday for Washington to present a memorial to President Roosevelt from the Great Council of Red Men of the United States, embodying resolutions congratulating and thanking President Roosevelt for his part in his policy of curing peace between Russia and Japan.

### Found Dead in His Factory.

WORCESTER, MASS., JAN. 5.—William Powell Allen, aged fifty-four years, a member of the firm of William Allen Sons Company, boiler makers, was found dead late last night in a portion of the factory seldom used. An investigation by the police showed that death was due to natural causes. Mr. Allen was last seen alive by his son about 5:30 o'clock.

### Sued, He Killed Himself.

SAN FRANCISCO, JAN. 5.—Lawrence E. Van Winkle, aged thirty-five years, one of the wealthy young men of San Francisco, committed suicide last night in Golden Gate Park by shooting himself in the head. Van Winkle last week was sued for \$15,000 damages by Charles N. Watson, a prosperous rancher of Casadero. Watson alleged that Van Winkle had violated the provisions of the Watson estate.

### Year's Killings in Macedonia.

SALONICA, EUROPEAN TURKEY, JAN. 5.—A return issued by the Turkish authorities shows that 1,022 casualties resulted from the fighting in Macedonia between Turkish troops and Bulgarian, Greek and Serbian revolutionary bands during 1905. Altogether 119 encounters took place in the Vilayets of Salonica, Monastir and Uskup in which the insurgents lost 620 men killed and 20 wounded.

### Dixon Charges Play Piracy.

R. LEIGH, N. C., JAN. 5.—Rev. Thomas Dixon, through attorneys here, has attached the property of the Corlaine Runkel Stock Company, now in Dublin, for presenting here and in Louisville, "In Reconstruction Days," a play which, he claims, is an infringement on the copyright of his "The Chieftain," but which Thomas Breton, of the Runkel Company, says he wrote in forty days from Dixon's and other novels.

### Japan's New Ministry.

LONDON, JAN. 5.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Tokio gives the following list of the members of the Ministry which he says will succeed that of Gen. Count Katsura: Premier, Marquis Saito; Foreign Affairs, Count Kato; Interior, Mr. Hara; Finance, Mr. Hasegawa; War, Lieut.-Gen. Terachi; Marine, Rear-Admiral Saito; Communications, Isaburo Yamagata; Education, Mr. Makino; Agriculture and Commerce, Mr. Matsucoka; Justice, Mr. Matuda.

### Eleven Mine Victims Found.

BLUEFIELD, W. VA., JAN. 5.—Eleven victims of the Coaldale mine disaster were removed from the mines to-day. Other bodies have been located.

## FIANCEE OF YOUNG BELMONT IS WELL

Wedding Is Set for Jan. 25, but Other Plans Are Indefinite.



Miss Alice De Glocouria has recovered from the attack of typhoid fever which caused the postponement of her marriage to August Belmont, Jr., which was to have occurred on Nov. 23, and the announcement was made to-day that the young couple would be wedded on Jan. 25.

## 'WITCHES' GARROTED FOR BABY'S MURDER

Two Cubans Killed Child to Give Its Heart to Woman as a Cure.

HAVANA, Jan. 5.—Domingo Boocort, an old negro, and Victor Molina, a mulatto, were garroted at the prison here to-day. Both men were regarded as "witches" by their associates. Their crime was the atrocious murder of a white baby, Zola Diaz, for the purpose of procuring the heart of a white female child which the "witches" prescribed as a poultice for a certain woman as a cure. The child's body was found, smoked and salted, weeks after the crime. The executions passed off promptly. There was no special incident, and no witnesses excepting those officially designated to be present. A dozen other men and women are imprisoned in connection with the crime.

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## WEALTHY WOMAN WILL BE DEPORTED

Driven Insane by Storms, Mrs. Thompson Must Return to England.

Driven mildly insane by her sufferings on a stormy voyage while in a previously weakened state, Mrs. Lydia M. Thompson, sixty-six years old, wife of an English country gentleman, will be deported to-morrow as an "insane alien." Mrs. Thompson arrived on Monday on the Minneapolis to visit her cousin, Mrs. E. Marsall Corey, of Overbrook, Pa., wife of the Philadelphia publisher of that name. She is still in her stateroom on the vessel, practically a prisoner. Through E. Marshall Corey, Jr., son of Mrs. Thompson's cousin, to-day offered Immigration Commissioner Watchorn any amount of security to guarantee that Mrs. Thompson would return to England after a few months' visit with her cousin. The Commissioner decided that the Immigration laws did not permit him to do otherwise than order her deported. All he could do, he said, was to make Mrs. Thompson as comfortable as possible while she awaits deportation, so he authorized her removal from Ellis Island, where she had been kept, to her stateroom on the Minneapolis. Mrs. Thompson intended to make a two-month visit with Mrs. Corey in Overbrook in the hope of regaining her health. She had been worn out in nursing her husband, who in eighty years old, through a long illness. His recovery found her in a greatly weakened state and her cousin learning of this invited her to stay here, where with quiet and rest she might regain her health. The Minneapolis encountered the worst of the Christmas gale, from the bursting of which all the Atlantic liners are out in it suffered severely. The roughness of the voyage so affected Mrs. Thompson in her condition, that when the ship reached Sandy Hook she was mentally unbalanced. She was not violent, but her deranged mind showed in confused and delirious fancies which plainly indicated her condition. She was examined by Dr. Stonoroff of the United States Marine Hospital service, who declared her insane. Mrs. Corey heard of her husband's plight and sent her son to plead with the Commissioner.
