

Ended Her Life Romance.

Beautiful Mary Poole's Tragic Death in Insane Asylum Recalls Her Career of Gayety.

Few women who started out in life with every promise of a brilliant future that beauty and wealth can offer have come to so sad an end as Mrs. Mary Poole, who was buried to-day from the home of her parents, on Bloomfield avenue, Montclair, N. J.

On Sunday Mrs. Poole, who was still a beautiful woman, hung herself in the Orange Hospital for the Insane. She had been mentally unbalanced for several years, and has been in three different institutions for the insane.

Notwithstanding these restraints the woman managed to hang herself by twisting a window cord about her neck and then climbing out the window and dropping from the ledge. She was dead when attendants of the hospital came to her.

She Loved Flattery. Mrs. Poole was a few years under forty. She was born in Montclair, and her maiden name was Mary Tronson.

Twenty years ago she was considered the handsomest young woman in Essex County. She was a beauty of a sort that Titian delighted to paint, and she knew it.

The tragedy of this beautiful woman's life was not causeless; in fact, it seemed to have been predestined from the very temperament of the woman. She loved flattery and attention; she thrived on gayety and excitement. She surrounded herself with a host of admirers and flirted with them all.

Two brothers, members of a wealthy Newark family, fell in love with her, and she gave them equal encouragement until each believed that he was the favored one. When they learned how their fair romance stood there followed a bitter quarrel between them that has never been healed.

Jilted by Man She Loved. Years passed in this way, until finally the young beauty really fell in love herself with a young man named Ned Royal, who lived in Montclair. But this romance was as unhappy for her as others had been for her suitors, for the young man liked her and married another girl, sending Miss Tronson word that he had only pretended to court her.

YOUNG WIFE SUES WEALTHY HUSBAND

In Court in Suit Brought by Another Woman When Papers Were Served.

Mrs. Josephine Goussett has brought suit on action against her husband, Cyrillus Goussett, a wealthy candy manufacturer, of No. 139 Prince street, Manhattan, for a legal separation and maintenance.

The defendant, who is sixty-five years of age, has a summer home at Allentown, Bergen County, and a fine residence in West Eighty-third street, Manhattan.

The plaintiff is an attractive young woman, twenty-five years of age, and, according to the complaint filed by her counsel, Leon Abbott, of Hoboken, she was compelled to leave her husband a year ago on account of improper treatment. Her maiden name was Dupont, and two years ago she was married to the defendant, who was a widower. A child was born to them, but it did not survive.

The papers regarding Mrs. Goussett's suit for a legal separation have been filed at Trenton. Since Mrs. Goussett had been living apart from her husband for some time, she was in plain clothes at the time.

POLICEMAN A PRISONER.

Dolan Arrested After Row with Car Conductor Over Fare.

Policeman Thomas Dolan, of the Oak street station, was a prisoner in the West Side Court to-day charged with assault by James T. Caffery, a conductor on the Twenty-sixth cross-town line. Dolan, who lives at No. 87 West Twenty-sixth street, said he boarded Caffery's car at Twenty-sixth street and Lexington avenue, and gave a transfer from the Lexington avenue line, which was accepted. A few blocks further on Dolan asked him for his fare again. He said he had paid it once and an argument followed which resulted in his arrest. Dolan was in plain clothes at the time.

Magistrate Belmont adjourned the case until to-morrow.

Became violent, attempted suicide and became incurably insane when she learned husband had been mortally injured while on his way to her. After two attempts, finally managed to kill herself.

with no other object in view than of teaching her a lesson. It was not long after this that the young woman married Joel Poole, of Newark, a son of one of the wealthiest families in New Jersey, a talented musician, man-about-town, sport, politician and society man. As the wife of Joel Poole the former Montclair belle found herself launched upon a sea of gayety and excitement.

Husband Killed by Train. Five years ago Mrs. Poole's health collapsed. First she was taken to a sanitarium by her husband, and from there removed to an institution for the insane at Dresden, N. Y. Her nervous system and mind seemed to have been completely shattered by her reckless manner of living.

Immediately after she entered the Dresden institution she made her first attempt at suicide. She had half-drowned herself in a lake when she was rescued. She repeated the attempt two years ago, but again failed. On that occasion her husband was called to the place, and on his way there he fell off a train and received mortal injuries.

When the wife heard of this she became violently and incurably insane and was removed to the Orange Hospital, where she was under constant restraint up to the day she killed herself.

KICKED ALMOST DEAD ON STREET

After Row with Women, Clune Said, He Was Set Upon and Robbed.

In a fight over a woman early to-day Henry Clune, a clerk, of No. 1101 Third avenue, was knocked down and kicked until he was unconscious on the sidewalk in front of a saloon at Eleventh street and Fourth avenue.

The doctors at Bellevue Hospital, where Clune was taken, said that Clune was almost kicked to death, that one blow from a man's heel probably fractured his skull over the right eye.

Policeman Trefzger, of the Fifth street station, heard cries for help. When he reached the corner he found Clune lying unconscious on the sidewalk. His face covered with blood. When revived Clune said that he had been drinking with a woman in the saloon, and that when they left he met another woman, whom he had known and who attacked him because he was with the other woman.

While they were quarrelling, he said, three or four men approached, knocked him down, kicked him and took \$20 from his pocket. When he was first struck the two women ran away together. The policeman saw the men running away. Clune said he never saw the men before, but would not tell who the women were.
