George J. Holyoake Dead. LONDON, JAN. 22.—George Jacob Holyoake, the author, lecturer and advocate of secularism, died at Brighton early to-day. He was born in 1817.

Accused of Son's Murder. MADISONVILLE, TEX., Jan. 22.—Rangers have arrested R. D. DeFee and J. H. DeFee on affidavits charging them with the murder of Tom DeFee, a son and brother of the accused men, who was beaten to death with an axe as he lay asleep in his home at Midway.

English Capital for Japan. SAN FRANCISCO, JAN. 22.—Shinsu Kondou, a Japanese capitalist, has arrived here from London on his way to Japan. Kondou has secured \$7,000,000 paid up capital in England which is to be invested in building a railway under the management of an Anglo-Saxon Japanese corporation.

Calve Finds Contralto. SEATTLE, WASH., JAN. 22.—Mme. Calve, who sang here in concert, has discovered a young girl contralto, Lola Feurt, for whom she predicts great things. The girl, who is seventeen years of age, was given an audition by Mme. Calve in the Lincoln Hotel, and pleased the prima donna so much with her singing that she told the girl she would formally adopt her and give her a thorough training in Paris.

Veteran Naval Chaplain Dead. ALAMEDA, CAL., JAN. 22.—John Singer Wallace, naval chaplain on the retired list, died yesterday after a brief illness. He was one of the oldest chaplains in the service, having received his appointment from President Lincoln in 1863. He was a native of Ohio, seventy-four years of age.

Dead from Hazing? GREENBURG, LA., JAN. 22.—Joseph Sitman, a sub-freshman who left Jefferson Military Academy on Jan. 11, is dead at his home here and it is alleged his death was due to injuries received at the hands of hazers at the college. The boy's father, Dr. C. W. Sitman, will demand an investigation. Lieut. Gus Morris, who was officer of the day at the college on Jan. 11, denies there had been any hazing at the college.

Profontaine's Body in Canada. HALIFAX, N. S., JAN. 22.—The body of Raymond Profontaine, Canadian Minister of Marines, who died in France Dec. 23, arrived here early today on board H. M. S. Dominion, which had been detailed to transport it to this country. The body was carried with military honors to the railroad station, and by special funeral train was started for Montreal. It was expected that Montreal would be reached to-morrow night.

Want Roosevelt's A 1 d. ANTWERP, BELGIUM, JAN. 22.—A committee of prominent Belgians appointed for the purpose of seeking the release by the Turkish Government of Edward Joris, the Belgian condemned to death by a native court at Constantinople for alleged participation in the attempt to assassinate the Sultan in July last, has decided to send a petition to Miss Alice Roosevelt asking her to interest President Roosevelt in the hope that he might personally intervene in behalf of Joris.

FOOTPADS WORK IN SCREEN OF DENSE FOG. Heavy Blanket Hides Streets of Bridgeport While Highwaymen Assault and Plunder Victims. (Special to The Evening World.) BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Jan. 22.—While the streets of this city were enveloped in a fog so dense that objects could not be discerned a rod distant in certain sections of the city, footpads operated boldly last night and early today.

BORN TO MISFORTUNE, AND HIS NAME IS LONELY.

Poor Hunchback Who Never Had a Home, Meets with a New Trouble.

Hungry and homeless, William Lonely pulled the latch-string of Father Knickerbocker's door. He asked for a place to sleep.

"Sure!" said Sergt. Smith, of the Alexander Avenue Station, Bronx. "What's your name? How old are you? Where do you live? Born in this country? Take him back, officer."

When he arrived at Morrisania Court on Saturday morning he seemed dazed. "Cheer up, lad; you're all right," the policeman said to him.

"I know I'm all right," the boy said. "But what are they going to do with me? I didn't do anything."

"Where did you come from?" asked an Evening World reporter.

Born to Misfortune. "From Cohoes," he said. "I am going to Norwich to find my father. That is, I am going to get out of here. What are they going to do with me? I must have been born to misfortune. I find it everywhere I turn. The world has no room for a hunchback. You see, I have been a cripple all my life."

"When I was nine years old my father left my mother in West Troy and I was sent to St. Hubert's Home. I stayed there until I was eighteen, three years ago. Then I went to Cohoes and got work in the silk mills.

"I met Tom Swins there and we became good friends. He said he knew a Thomas Lonely in Danbury, Conn., and I thought it was my father, so I wrote there. Here is a letter I got back. You see, he says he is my grandfather. He says my father is in Norwich, working in the silk mills.

"I thought I would go to Norwich. I wanted to see my father and live with him. I know I can get a job in the mills. So I worked my way down on a freight. I thought I was going


