EXPLODING BOMB TEARS HOLE IN BIG TROOP SHIP

One Killed and 26 Hurt on Vessel Crowded with Russians.

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—Herr Smith, director of the Hamburg-American line, announced this afternoon that the German steamer Silvia, of that line, which left Vladivostok Monday with a large number of Russian troops who were returning home, struck a mine and had to return in a sinking condition to Vladivostok, where she was run ashore in order to prevent her becoming a total loss.

With the exception of a cook no lives were mentioned as having been lost. Twenty-five men, however, were injured.

TROOP ATTEMPT TO BURN IRON WORKS IN JERSEY

After Setting Fire to Fagan's Plant Incendiary Telephoned Him.

The third attempt in a year to burn the plant of the Fagan Iron Works, in Jersey City, was made last night.

The incendiaries soaked the base of some of the buildings with kerosene oil, started the blaze and then telephoned to Mr. Fagan, inviting him to call around and see his property as an incendiary.

Lawrence Fagan, former Mayor of Hoboken, is the owner of the Fagan Iron Works.

The plant is at Fourteenth and Monmouth streets, in a manufacturing region enjoying little or no fire protection.

The first blaze, a year ago, supposed to have been of incendiary origin, almost wiped out all the buildings and utterly destroyed thousands of dollars worth of valuable patterns.

The man who started the fire last night, in a spirit of bravado, telephoned an alarm to Police Headquarters and the Fire Headquarters in addition to the incendiary.

A new tin can, partly filled with kerosene, was found across the street from the plant.
