

BOWLERS REQUIRE FULL SERIES TO DECIDE GAMES

Greater N. Y. Tournament Draws Large Crowds at the Local Alleys.

Two full series of eleven games were rolled in the Greater New York individual tournament last night, Billy Linden defeating P. J. Riddell at Linden's, Ninety-sixth street and Broadway, and Otto Hellas winning from George Haller at Esplanette's Broadway, Brooklyn, the home alley rollers winning by close scores.

Each series was the first for the alleys on which the games were bowled and the large crowd present was only a further indication of the great general interest manifested even in the most sections in this tournament, which has developed more excitement in bowling circles than any of the past.

The Linden-Riddell contest, which has developed more excitement in bowling circles than any of the past, started at the two women's tournament at Harmon Circle alleys Monday, March 5.
