

MOTHER FIGHTS TO RELEASE HER GIRL

Gerry Law Holds Daughter in Bondage Despite Acquittal of Her Parent.

Lillian Maurice, a remarkably pretty brunette of eighteen years, is the victim of a too industrious plain-clothes man and a law passed in 1905, giving the courts specific guardianship over girls of susceptible age.

Mrs. Lillian Maurice is the proprietor of a massage establishment in Twenty-third street, near Madison avenue. She displays a rare combination of brains and beauty.

Mrs. Maurice was arrested by the plain-clothes man on a charge of keeping disorderly house and Miss Lillian was taken along for her own safety.

Magistrate Wahle in Yorkville Court held the mother for trial in Special Sessions and committed Lillian to the Home of the Holy Family, conducted by the sisters of the Divine Compassion.

Mother Was Acquitted. The mother's trial came on, and on the evidence presented by her accusers she was promptly acquitted.

Then Maurice Meyer was called in, and he found that a motor law dealer, three institutions, the Bedford Home, House of the Good Shepherd and the House of the Holy Family, which young girls might be omitted.

Mrs. Meyer got out a writ of habeas corpus, and Miss Lillian was brought before Justice Amend in the Supreme Court yesterday. Mr. Meyer contended that as she had been committed to an institution not designated by this law, it was voidable and no commitment at all.

Assistant District Attorney Johnstone, opposing, said that the girl's case was like that of a convict sentenced to a term of imprisonment not specified in the law. In such cases the practice was to return the convict to the committing court for resentencing.

Sent Case to Wahle. Justice Amend took this view and sent Miss Maurice back to Magistrate Wahle, now in the Police Court, for sentence this afternoon.

Should the Magistrate commit her to one of the three institutions specified, another writ will be obtained and the case fought out on its merits.

It is alleged that the mother and in a transcript of the testimony of Mrs. Maurice, she makes affidavit that her patients are never massaged in the nude, but are always draped; that Lillian takes no part in the operation and never enters the operating-room.

"The Court of Special Sessions thought so, too," said Mrs. Maurice to an Evening World reporter. "I don't look like such a vile woman as would take my own daughter and have her do anything wrong."

Feel Certain Chirico Has Been Murdered.

Wealthy Italian Had \$700 in Cash When He Disappeared Two Weeks Ago.

Pietro Chirico, the wealthy Italian who disappeared on Feb. 14 while carrying \$700, is still being sought by his relatives and by the police. Nicola Conaroli, his brother-in-law, believes that the rich property owner was made a victim of the Black Hand Society.

Another theory advanced is that Chirico was the victim of nervous trouble and according to Conaroli, he may have suddenly suffered a brain attack. The theory is that Chirico was very wealthy and always carried a large amount of money.

Chirico owned \$20,000 worth of property, including two large flat houses in Brooklyn, a home near Bath Junction, three saloons in Manhattan, one in Brooklyn and one in Jersey City.

Chirico was last seen heavily built, when last seen he wore a dark suit and derby hat. He was a wife and five children.

Neighbors have told Mrs. Finkelstein that as the girl was entering school just across the street from her home she was accosted by a man and woman, and the three were seen later boarding a trolley car for Hoboken.

They all went to New York, according to Mrs. Finkelstein, and there a lawyer on the east side drew up papers, in which Mr. Hornstein agreed to give the girl in charge of the aunt until she should become of age. The consideration for the surrender of the child, the woman alleges, was \$500.
