ST. PETERSBURG, March 1.—The official Russian Gouardarstvo announces that a direct steamship service between Lagan and New York will be established at the opening of navigation.


RAILROADS SUMMONED BY COMMERCE BOARD.

CLAICHE GIRL GIVES WAY TO SOBS IN COURT

(Continued from First Page.) Twenty-seventh street when he heard the sound of a struggle in the hallway. He looked in and saw a man beating the defendant. They were wrestling around and the woman was groaning. Sav' Jerry Beaten. "He hauled off and smashed her with his fist," declared the witness. Q. How was she dressed? A. She wasn't dressed at all. Q. Describe the man? A. He was about 6 feet 2, broad-shouldered, with black hair and mustache and a scar on the side of his face. Q. What did this defendant do? A. She broke away from him and ran down the street with nothing on but a chemise. His eye was swollen and there were marks on her throat. Q. Did you talk to the man? A. I told him at Seventh avenue and Twenty-fifth street that the girl had gone with a policeman. He said if he came back with an officer he would kill her and showed a gun. Mr. Ely made a persistent attempt to break down this witness. His own testimony was sworn and put on the stand. English the three letters written by Berthe Claiche to Gerdon. The letters told of detectives and stool-kickers watching her and of other girls being arrested. One day she says the detectives watched her home, so she did not go out at all. She says she saw the saloon-keeper opposite and he promised to talk to the detective. The letters were written to Gerdon, who was at Wanequan, N. J. Two were sent the latter part of May last. They were signed "Your wife" for "all life." "Your wife who loves you, and thinks of you for all her life." A third letter was written June 17, just a week before the row when Gerdon blackened her eye and drove her from their flat. This closes with "Five million darling kisses. Your own wife, Berthe." Q. Did you meet her frequently after that? A. Yes, at the same place. Q. Did you ever see Gerdon there? A. About ten times. Q. Ever quarrel with him? A. I did not. Justice Davis said there was no use in further examining about this line. He declared there is no evidence whatever of any conspiracy between Morton and the Claiche girl to kill Gerdon. "Does that go on the record?" asked Mr. Ely. "It is on the record," replied the Court. No Warrant for Gerdon. Q. After the trunk was removed what did you do? A. I accompanied Berthe Claiche to the rooms in Seventh avenue. Q. Did you ever visit the home of the man? A. On one occasion, two or three days after the trunk was removed, I went as a policeman to see the defendant, who had complained to me of an assault upon her by Gerdon. Her eyes were blackened and there were bruises on her throat and breast. Q. Did you have a warrant? A. I did not know a warrant was necessary. The two sisters of Berthe Claiche were brought into court to allow Morton to identify the one he saw at the home of Berthe's mother. For the first time in court the girl broke down. One of the sisters, who is a tall young girl with a fresh complexion. The other is small with black hair streaked with gray. The two girls stood behind the chair of the prisoner, Jeanette, the small, dark sister, reached out hesitatingly an distraught Berthe's shoulder. Tears sprang into the brown eyes of the young defendant, and covering her face with her handkerchief, she bent over and sobbed without respite. The examination was shifted to the night of July 8, when Gerdon was shot. Morton said that he met the Claiche girl on the street on Thursday and she told him Gerdon was to be at Twenty-fifth street and Seventh avenue on Saturday night. She asked him to arrest Gerdon.
