

BLISS TO TELL OF FUNDS GOT FOR CAMPAIGNS

Republican Treasurer Is Grand Jury Witness in Insurance Inquiry.

CONFERS WITH JEROME

Will Be Called Upon for List of Moneys Given to Defeat Bryan and Parker.

It was stated from an authoritative source at the District-Attorney's Office to-day, that Cornelius N. Bliss, who was treasurer of the National Republican Campaign Committee during the McKinley and Roosevelt campaigns, will be summoned before the Grand Jury this week to tell of the enormous contributions made to the Republican cause by insurance companies.

Mr. Bliss called upon District-Attorney Jerome to-day and was closeted with him for more than an hour. He went to the Criminal Courts Building, it was said, at Mr. Jerome's request, and was examined at length concerning the same contributed to the Republican party managers by the big life insurance companies and the circumstances attending such contributions.

Mr. Bliss's connection with the insurance contributions made for the purpose of defeating William J. Bryan was revealed before the Armstrong Committee in the testimony of the late John C. McCall. It was not possible then, however, to go into the matter of the many contributions made by other companies, and this will be investigated when the financier is called before the Grand Jury.

Silent as to Conference. After leaving Mr. Jerome's office Mr. Bliss refused to discuss the nature of his visit, or whether or not he went voluntarily to the District-Attorney's office. Neither would Mr. Jerome talk of the matter.

The visit of the Republican treasurer is doubly significant to-day, as to-morrow was the day set for Judge O'Sullivan, of General Sessions, to give the Grand Jury its final legal instructions on the nature of the crimes committed by the insurance leads in tribing national and State party managers with campaign contributions.

Mr. Jerome announced to-day that he would have ready his brief of instructions for the Grand Jury to-morrow and would hand it to Judge O'Sullivan. It has been freely stated of late that the District-Attorney is seeking to put the onus of the insurance investigation upon the shoulders of Judge O'Sullivan, making suggestions himself that will be so sweeping in their character that if the Court fails to include them in his charge to the jury no blame of failure may fall upon him, if the guilty officials are not indicted.

Judge is Cautious. Judge O'Sullivan is proceeding very cautiously in the matter and is devoting a great deal of time to the study of the law bearing on the crimes the insurance officers are alleged to have committed in making campaign contributions and bribing legislators. It is said now that when he does make his charge to the Grand Jury he will do so in the privacy of the Grand Jury room.

Former Assistant District-Attorney Brand, counsel for the indicted officers of the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company, appeared before Judge O'Sullivan to-day and asked for permission to inspect the minutes of the Grand Jury covering the indictment of his clients. He talked for five minutes, urging that it was only just for him to learn if any unlawful evidence had been presented and if it was reasonable for the indictment for bribery and forgery of President Frederick B. Burnham, Vice-President George Burnham and Secretary Eldridge of the Mutual Reserve.

District-Attorney Jerome opposed the motion on the ground that the secret investigations of the Grand Jury should remain inviolate. Judge O'Sullivan reserved decision.

WOMAN DIES IN STREET.

PATRICK SAVES PRISONER FROM CHAIR OF DEATH

Mike Breusch, Awaiting Execution, Gets a New Trial.

MURDERER HIS LAWYER

Patrick Raised All the Points for the Slayer of Policeman Enright.

Albert T. Patrick, awaiting execution in the death cells at Sing Sing Prison, has been so far unable to secure a new trial for himself, but he has been more successful in the case of one of his fellow condemned, Mike Breusch, who killed Policeman Enright, at Fifty-fifth street and Third avenue, two years ago. The Court of Appeals, on points raised by Patrick, has reversed the conviction of Breusch and he will be given a new trial.

Enright caught Breusch trying to break into a Third avenue bakery just before daylight. Breusch ran, but Enright, who was attached to the East Fifty-first street station, drew his revolver and gave chase. Breusch turned and fired, the bullet striking Enright in the chest. The wounded policeman fell a block further and man and dog dropped dead. The man was captured in a cellar on Second avenue half an hour after the shooting.

Convicted and Sentenced. He was hurried to trial and was defended in court by Dave May and Nat Cohen, of Abe Hummel's office. A prompt conviction was found, and Breusch was sentenced to die during the week beginning July 1, 1904. May Cohen was so confident that the case was hopeless that they did not even serve notice of an appeal.

Patrick's friends and those who work at Sing Sing, and was placed in the death cells to await the call to the chair. The alert mind of Patrick became busy on the case of the burglar-murderer, and the two men held several serious conferences.

Patrick told Breusch that he could get a new trial if he would serve a notice of appeal upon Edward Carroll, the Clerk of the Court of General Sessions. Breusch laughed.

"Why," he said, "they've got me dead. I'll have to take my medicine. I ain't got no lawyer and I ain't got no money." "I'll be your lawyer," declared Patrick. "I'll have to draw up a formal and legal notice of appeal, to which Breusch affixed his signature. It was sworn to before Principal Keeper Cunningham, who is a notary public, and Cunningham mailed it to Mr. Carroll on July 5, just six days before the date set for the execution.

Execution Postponed. Mr. Carroll presented the notice in due form and the Court accepted it. This was equivalent to a stay until the case could be argued in the Court of Appeals. The Court accepted it, and fully expected to die on July 11, received notice that the execution of his sentence had been postponed.

The apparently miraculous intervention of Patrick aroused the interest of the Court, and he was permitted to work in earnest to assist his benefactor. Patrick prepared the argument to be used before the Court of Appeals. He asked for a new trial, and the matter that Breusch shot in self-defense. He held that Breusch was not on the premises he attempted to burglarize when he killed the policeman, but was a fugitive and shot only after he had been fired at and was in danger of his own life.

When the case, grinding through the slow machinery of the law, finally reached the Court of Appeals, there was, of course, no one to argue it in behalf of Breusch. The court assigned Attorney Leon Levy to attend the matter. Mr. Levy made his argument strictly along the lines laid down by Patrick, with the result that the judges upheld the contention of the lawyer-convict, and Breusch will get another show for his life.

GIANTESS MORE THAN 7 FEET TALL IS HERE.

Rosa Wedsted Comes from Finland to Appear in Barnum & Bailey Circus.

One of the most interesting passengers on the Blucher, of the Hamburg-American Line, which arrived from Hamburg to-day, was Rosa Wedsted, a giantess from Finland, who will make her first American appearance with the Barnum & Bailey Circus when it opens the season at Madison Square Garden, Thursday afternoon, March 22.

Miss Wedsted is considerably over seven feet in height, and is credited with being the tallest woman in the world. She is comely and well-proportioned, and has a pleasing appearance and address. She has appeared in most of the European capitals, and has recently been on exhibition in Berlin. She is unmarried, and her meeting with the Barnum & Bailey Circus, is being awaited with considerable interest by the show folks.

Miss Wedsted is so tall that she would not fit in any ordinary berth without twisting herself into knots, and special arrangements were made on the Blucher for her accommodation.
