

THEY KNEW A BOMB WHEN THEY SAW IT

Sure They Did, and Carstens and His Bartender Put the Package Out in Gutter.

DAREDEVIL TO RESCUE.

He Was Thirsty and Didn't Fear Powder—Police Hunt the "Miscreant" and Carstens Prospers.

Henry Carstens, Jr., is doing a fine business to-day in his saloon at Crescent and Grand avenues, East New York. Somebody sent him a bomb last night, but the miscreant did not know Henry. He knew there was something wrong about that package just as soon as he looked at it.

Mr. Carstens's bartender is also a prophet or the son of a prophet. When the mail carrier delivered a box neatly wrapped, about four inches long and two inches wide last night the bartender was in charge of the saloon.

"What's in that box," he says he said to the mail carrier, "dynamite?" "Well, you can't tell," he says the mail carrier said.

"You can bet I won't open it," he says he said, although why he should open a package addressed to his employer is not apparent.

Mr. Carstens got around in a few minutes. Would he open that package? No, indeed! He wasn't expecting anything in the way of a package, he says he said. Finally curiosity got the better of him and he tore off the outside wrapping, revealing a tin box.

Little black particles fell out of the box when he pulled at the cover. They looked like particles of powder to him. He placed the box out in the gutter.

"I wouldn't open that for all the money in Brooklyn," he says he said. News of the arrival of the infernal machine had spread around and the cash register bell was making a noise like an alarm clock. Then came the neighborhood daredevil. He had a thirst and no money. Would he open the box for a drink? In a minute.

He opened the box as nonchalantly as though he were cracking a peanut. It was an infernal machine as right as rain. There were twenty matches, a piece of sandpaper and a tin of powder, so arranged that the box would explode if it exploded if the matches had ignited on the sandpaper at the psychological moment, which, of course, they did not.

ACTOR COLLIER AND WIFE PARTED

Through an action brought by Louise Allen Collier, wife of William Collier, comedian, it became known yesterday that the couple have been legally separated since last December. Mrs. Collier has begun an action to compel her husband to dispose of real estate holdings he has at St. James, L. I.

It has been rumored in theatrical circles for several months that Mr. and Mrs. Collier have been on the verge of separation, but until yesterday's action the true situation did not become fully known. A paragraph in the afternoon edition of the Post, Dec. 16, reads: "Whereas, during the past year and a half, differences have arisen, and the parties have agreed to live separately."

Mr. Collier agreed to pay his wife \$100 a week; to assign to her all of their household furniture, and to sell his real estate at St. James, L. I., and to give her one-half of the proceeds. Collier has considerable property at St. James and his wife says he refused to sell it.

In his answer to her complaint on March 7 Collier denied that he had amended that answer on March 22 and said the reason he had not sold the property was because the time of year was not ripe for fair prices on real estate in that section.
