SHOT MAN WHO INSULTED HER IN THE STREET

Mrs. de Louisa Husband's Cousin Tried to Force Her to Elope With Him.

Mrs. Patricia de Louisa, faithful wife and mother of five children, shot down a man who insulted her at One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and First avenue today, while she carried her baby in her arms, and then went quietly to her home, at No. 33 East One Hundred and Twelfth street, and prepared to cook breakfast for her other little ones.

For weeks past Mrs. de Louisa, whose husband, Angelo, is a hard-working man, a good husband and father, is employed in street improvements at One Hundred and Nineteenth street and Pleasant avenue, has been followed by John de Louisa, a cousin of her husband. Only recently the young wife and mother appealed to the police to stop the man shadowing her.

She told the police that John was constantly at her heels when she ventured on the street, and that he often went to her home and made himself offensive. A Magistrate in Harlem Police Court warned John to keep away from his cousin's wife.


Told of his infatuation, John de Louisa is a married man with three children. His home is at No. 42 East One Hundred and Twelfth street, but it is said that he made no secret of his infatuation for the wife of his cousin. He promised the court to get about his business, and kept the promise until today.

Mrs. de Louisa left four of her children asleep in her home. She took her youngest, a boy eight months old, and started with him to the grocery of John Weizer, at One Hundred and Sixteenth street and First avenue, to make purchases for breakfast. Coming out of the grocery she encountered her husband's cousin.

"You are coming with me now," John de Louisa is said to have cried, and at the same instant he seized her by the arm.

Mrs. de Louisa sprang back, wrested herself free from the man's grasp and whipped a revolver from the folds of her gown. Still holding her baby in

that this was his cousin. Until a short time ago, the police say, John was famous as a kind of workman. He made free with the men under him and often called at their homes. Because of this he lost his place, and Angelo was made foreman. Since Angelo was promoted he has been in constant danger.

On Saturday last Angelo was attacked in the night and left unconscious on the street after being hit with a blackjack. Then his wife was warned that she was to be cut so that her beauty would be spoiled and that her husband was to be killed.

Foared for Husband, Mrs. de Louisa and her sister were in a park near their home last night when they met John de Louisa and his wife. John threatened them and they fled from the park. It was then that Mrs. de Louisa armed herself.

The police say that the wife was so fearful lest her husband be attacked by John de Louisa, the man who was infatuated with her and who sought revenge on him, that when he arose at dawn today to go to his work she accompanied him. Returning home she took her baby and started to the grocery. Then it was she encountered her husband's cousin.

"My husband has deceived me. I thought he was a good man. Now I know that he was a villain. No man could treat me as he has done, and treat his cousin and his cousin's wife as he has, and not be a villain."

Both got the name and address of the woman, and after sending her to the De Louisa home, Mrs. de Louisa was going about her household duties as quietly as though nothing had occurred.

"You have just shot a man on the street," said the policeman.

"Yes, I did, and he insulted me," she said. "I had to do it. That man would ruin my home and my husband's and my children's home. It was my duty to shoot him."

"I've got to arrest you," the policeman said.

"I am willing to be arrested," said the young woman. "I will have to take my baby with me, though. The baby can't be left alone."

Then, with the baby in her arms, Mrs. de Louisa followed the policeman to the station-house and was locked up. The baby still in her arms.
