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CHICAGO SHUTS OUT GIANTS TO DISMAY OF 20,000 FANS

CANFIELD LOSES; JURY ORDERS HIM TO PAY \$45,000

John Delahanty Obtains Verdict for Full Amount Claimed as Counsel Fees After His Lawyer Had Denounced Gambler as a Welcher.

John Delahanty this afternoon won his suit against Richard Canfield for \$45,000 counsel fees. The jury, after considering the case for an hour and a half, brought in a verdict for the full amount.

This verdict was reached after a day of argument in which opposing counsel bitterly assailed the gambler and his former lawyer, who sued for fees he alleged he had earned during Canfield's long struggle with Jerome.

Lawyer Snowden Marshall, in summing up for Canfield, asserted that Delahanty had given the gambler improper advice, and broadly hinted that his charge of enormous fees was a hold-up.

Edmund L. Mooney, attorney for Delahanty, specifically accused Canfield of perjury in swearing that he had made no promise of 25 per cent in commission for collecting the \$30,000 Reginald Vanderbilt notes. "Canfield is a welcher," said Mooney, "and this gambler knows what that means."

Before the lawyers began summing up Delahanty was recalled to the stand.

Harry Gansfield, fourth juror, asked permission to propound a question to the lawyer.

"Wasn't James W. Osborne, who was on the stand yesterday, and who testified your services were worth only \$100, an Assistant District Attorney against you when you represented the defendant in the criminal proceedings?"

"He was," replied the witness emphatically. "And I beat him."

Edmund L. Mooney, Mr. Delahanty's trial counsel, called him in rebuttal. Delahanty denied statements made by Bucklin to the effect that the gambler's manager was at the Fifth Avenue Bank to remove his employer's safety deposit box three hours ahead of the lawyer.

"That isn't so," remarked the witness sternly. "I was there much ahead of Q. Did you tell Canfield not to remove the gambling paraphernalia from his house on the ground it was not contraband. A. I did not."

Q. What was the first you knew about it? A. A policeman told me of the confiscation some time after the raid.

Gives Lie to Canfield. Delahanty also gave the lie to the gambler's statement that the witness had cabled him (Canfield) in London, telling him of the indictment.

This ended the case of the plaintiff. Snowden Marshall, of counsel for Delahanty, addressed the jury. He said there was little he could say that would aid them in reaching a decision further than that Canfield's relations with the lawyer must be considered from a business standpoint.

RAINEY RETIRES \$45,000 DE MUND FOR SARATOGA

Owner Believes Two-Year-Old May Have Been Overtrained.

TO START IN SPECIAL.

Owner Not Dissatisfied with Handling or Riding by Radtke.

BELOMONT PARK RACE TRACK, N. Y., June 5.—De Mund, the 14,000 colt, has practically been retired. That is, he will not start again until August, when the great colt will be seen in the Saratoga Special, one of the most interesting of turf events.

Paul J. Rainey made the foregoing announcement to-day when seen in the clubhouse. At the same time Mr. Rainey took the occasion to deny the recently circulated stories to the effect that he was in any sense dissatisfied with his \$25,000 rider, Jockey Radtke, or his trainer, "Bud" May.

It has been the surmise of many an experienced turf man that De Mund has been overtrained. This was pointed out in the Evening World to-day. Mr. Rainey confirmed that impression. He said: "It is just possible that De Mund has not been handled properly since coming into our possession. I cannot say anything but that the colt has fallen off in weight. He needs a rest, and it will be afforded him."

The hand will not only start in the Saratoga Special, but I am as confident as I stand here that De Mund, in improved form, will win that Special race. I did not buy a gold brick when I bought De Mund."

Then, referring to the gossip reporting Mr. Rainey to have been suspicious of certain persons of his stable managers, Mr. Rainey said: "I want to say all this gossip aside by stating, on my word of honor, that I am thoroughly satisfied with, not only Radtke, but my trainer, Mr. May. I was, no, at the track Saturday when De Mund was beaten, and of that race I am not content to make any statement from personal observation, but there is not enough money in the world to obtain over my sanction a separation now from Radtke or Mr. May. I have never had any such thought. I hope that emphatic statement will set further talk at rest."

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RADTKE WINS

ON AERONAUT FROM MILLER

\$25,000 Jockey Captures Third of Serial Handicaps by a Nose.

FINISH WAS HAIR-RAISING

Belgravia, Jaunta and King Cole Among the Belmont Winners.

BELOMONT RACE TRACK, June 5.—Radtke put it on Miller again in the Van Cortlandt Handicap at Belmont Park this afternoon. It was a nose finish, as it was in the Claremont, and Radtke was there with the finish.

Incidentally Radtke, by winning the Van Cortlandt, rode all three winners of what are known as the spring serial handicaps, a feat that has never been equaled by any other rider.

Miller had the mount on Dolly Spunker in the Van Cortlandt and was made the favorite. Radtke rode Aeronaut, who was a 7 to 1 choice because few believed Aeronaut would travel seven furlongs under pressure.

Aeronaut went away in front and thinned to the stretch. There Dolly Spunker, who had been interfered with early, raced into second place. At the furlong pole Dolly Spunker closed on Aeronaut and in a few jumps landed on Miller. Then in the furious drive which followed Radtke was the best finisher, and he lifted Aeronaut in a winner by a nose.

In the Claremont Radtke just nosed out Miller on Dolly Spunker, riding Flip Flap at that time in the Trotton. Radtke rode Aeronaut, but had rather an easy victory.

Oliver Cromwell was made favorite in the opening dash. Oliver Cromwell is a hoodoo horse. He has been favorite a great many times, and a vault full of money has been burned up on him. To-day he was off badly and had no chance. The public played Miller, and Miller brought home the money. He rode Belgravia and Bayonet, he pressed to the front and came home arguing. McKittredge, who dropped out of the race early, closed strong and just nipped Bayonet. Jaunta, the favorite in the second race, won after a hard drive.

"Jack" McGinnies, a club-house commissioner, won \$10,000 on the victory of Aeronaut in the Van Cortlandt Handicap, playing the horse at sixties and sixes.

It was Radtke and Miller in the second race, the latter riding Loyal, who was racing for the first time. In this race there was a terrific run on Gold Lady, owned by A. L. Astor, the "Bookie King." Gold Lady was backed from 20 to 1 to 5 to 1 and a big chunk would have been taken out of the ring if she had won. She was off poorly and was coming like a whirlwind at the end, but just got up in time to get a hot fire. King Cole was the third race after a hot drive with Aeronaut through the last furlong. Miller deliberately rode Gold through the drive but the stewards did not question him.

"Mattie" Curl, a club-house commissioner, and Jack London, a bookmaker, had a personal encounter in the betting ring during the last race. Curl wanted to bet \$50 on Orton Dobble. London hesitated.

ALL SLAUGHTER HOUSES IN STATE UNDER SCRUTINY

Sweeping Order Issued from Albany for Full Inspection.

ALBANY, June 5.—Commissioner Porter of the State Department of Health today mailed instructions to all local health officers in the State directing them to make an immediate and thorough inspection of any and all meat packing establishments or slaughter houses within their jurisdiction.

"Any such conditions as those commented on by President Roosevelt in his special message to Congress," says Dr. Porter in his letter, "are intolerable and must not be allowed to continue if they exist in this State. Particular notice should be paid to unsanitary conditions in which meats, etc., are handled, ventilation of buildings and methods of handling meats."

CHICAGO, June 5.—Three sanitary inspectors were to-day sent to the stock-yards by Commissioner of Health Whelan, with instructions to make a thorough inspection of the methods of handling meat, to examine the sanitary conditions of the employees and to make an immediate report concerning any unsanitary conditions that may be found.

Building Commissioner Bartzan also sent a number of inspectors to the stock-yards to examine all the buildings in the yards. He gave them instructions to report any violations of the building ordinances that are apparent.

Altherrman Peters, at the meeting of the Board this afternoon, offered a resolution providing for a special committee to investigate the packing and slaughter houses in this city. He asked immediate consideration, but all over a howl of objections from all over the house, and the resolution had to be referred to the Committee on Rules.
