

ENGLISH CROOK ARRESTED HERE, \$5,000 REWARD

Detectives Pick Up Man Wanted for Raffles Like Robbery.

STOLE A PEARL ROPE.

Substituted Empty Bag While Salesman Was in Birmingham Shop.

Mr. Joseph Stellman, gentleman crook and world wanderer, for whose arrest a reward of a thousand pounds is offered, is locked up at Headquarters today, while Inspector McLaughlin in cable communication with Chief Constable C. H. Rafter, of Birmingham, England, Stellman is accused of having turned a trick on a French jewelry drummer that sounds like one of the stunts of Raffles and netted a reward worth \$5,000 for himself and his skill, Sarnel Lockitt, who has been arrested in England.

Stellman, only twenty-four years old, and an athlete, has already served three terms in English jails, and in the intervals of freedom has found time to wander pretty nearly all over the world. His wanderings last night brought him to Twenty-fourth street and Eighth avenue. Detective-Sergts. Valley and Collins took him. The

taking process was painful to them and to Stellman, who is a bit of a boxer.

Substituted Empty Bag.

The story as the police tell it is about like this: Stellman and Lockitt, his pal, noticed a simple-looking drummer wandering over the United Kingdom with a bit bag filled with ropes of pearls and diamond encrustations. He was traveling for the big French jewelry firm of Glattauer, Bros. No. 4 rue de Provence, Paris.

Stellman and Lockitt purchased a bag exactly like that of the drummer and waited an opportunity to use it. They came upon the drummer in a Birmingham chemist's shop and while one of them engaged him in conversation the other substituted the empty bag for that containing the jewels. They got safely away before the drummer discovered the trick.

Lockitt was caught afterward and went up for five years, but Stellman slipped over to the Continent and did not come to America until April. The jewelry firm offered a reward of 1,000 pounds for his arrest, and the police all over the world were notified.

Says It's a Mistake.

The New York detectives became convinced that Stellman would probably come here eventually, for about 200 pearls of the Glattauer loot were found in various New York shops where they had been sold or pawned by accomplices. The police found also that Lockitt, who was caught in England, was arrested here in 1898 for holding up a messenger boy at Park avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street. The boy was coming from the Mount Morris bank with a sackful, but it contained only \$6 in silver change.

At Headquarters Stellman denied he was the drummer and said he is a machinist in Brooklyn. He is a well-built young fellow and dresses immaculately. By his look and manner he would pass almost anywhere as a young Englishman of breeding.

FIVE-MASTER RUNS AGROUND IN A FOG.



SLAPPED GIRL AND BEGAN LABOR WAR

1,200 Necktie Makers Defying Lockout that Followed Act of Boss.

MUSIC HOLDS STRIKERS.

Woman Executives "Keep Up Courage" with Concerts and Demand Concessions.

Is chivalry dead? Not when 200 persons were out of forty-five shops because a boss slapped a girl.

The entire membership of the Neckwear Makers' Union, 300 girls and 400 men, has stopped work because Meyer Borse, of No. 24 Lafayette street, slapped his pretty employee, Fannie Tepper.

The girls' union rallied to Fannie's support. A committee of five young women, with Sarah Braumstein, secretary of the union, as chairman, judged the boss to be guilty of ungalvanizing, fined him \$5 and demanded an apology. Borse refused to pay the fine and, for apology, appeared before the union and added insult to injury. Whereupon the neckwear makers struck.

Retailer with Lockout.

The mass-meeting that decided to hold out for "polite treatment to our young ladies" met. When the contractors found their shops empty the next morning they called a meeting of their own association and turned the ladies on the strikers by declaring a lockout.

Now the strike is on in earnest. The forty-five neckwear shops where union members were employed are guarded against the "snob" invasion. The girl strikers do picket duty and the men the heavy athletic work. Ten strikers have been arrested, but bailed by the union, for assaulting strike-breakers.

Samuel Holstein, of No. 83 Lewis street, and Samuel Deaton, of No. 283 Stanton street, walking delegates for the union, were arrested in Essex Market Court today, charged with assault.

David Levine, a neckwear maker, of No. 20 East Broadway, accused the policemen of entering his factory and

One Drumstick Shy on the Chicken, Produced as Exhibit A.



PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 11.—Virtual settlement of the strike of mine workers in the Central Pennsylvania bituminous field, which began last April, was made in this city at a conference between representatives of the United Mine Workers of America and the operators in that field, which lasted until after midnight. The settlement was a 6 1/2 per cent. increase in wages which existed before the strike, and application of the check-off system to miners, but not to laborers.



ASSASSIN'S AGAIN ATTEMPT LIFE OF CZAR'S ADMIRAL

Chouknin, Just Recovering from Wounds, Falls Under Attack.

MARKED BY TERRORISTS.

While New Mutiny Breaks Out, Murder of Black Sea Fleet Commander Tried.

SEVASTOPOL, July 11.—An attempt was made at 11 o'clock this afternoon to assassinate Vice-Admiral Chouknin, commander of the Black Sea fleet.

The Admiral was wounded and taken to a hospital. This is the second attempt within five months to kill the Vice-Admiral. In view of the fact that Admiral Chouknin is only recovering from pistol wounds received in the last attack, it is thought he may succumb in the present instance.

On Feb. 10 last a woman entered the Admiral's office here and, on the pretense of being the daughter of an old friend of Chouknin, engaged him in conversation. While she talked she drew a rapider pistol and fired four shots at the Admiral with aim so good that every bullet hit him.

As he fell she turned and ran, but an orderly who rushed to the Admiral's assistance shot and killed her. The woman was later identified as Cecelia Shabat, twenty-two years old, daughter of a rich merchant of Minsk.

The terrorists had warned Admiral Chouknin that they had marked him for his cruelty in smothering any effort of protest by the ill-fated, ill-treated sailors of his fleet. When the death sentence of the odious traitress was before the Admiral for review, the terrorists formally notified him that if he approved them the same fate would be his, surely.

Chouknin is hated for his severity, and it was to his treatment of the crews of the ships under his command that the mutiny on board the battleship Kriaz Potemkin in June and July last year was attributed. The Admiral displayed considerable activity in attempting to capture the mutineers at that time and in suppressing the sailors' mutiny at Sebastopol in November last.

It was reported here last night that the Russian ironclad Panteleimon and Three Saints had joined the garrison of Batoum (province of Kutais, Transcaucasia), on the east coast of the Black Sea, which had been notified that the Three Saints had hoisted the red flag, and that the mutineers were forcibly detaining two other ironclads which had refused to join them.

The Panteleimon was formerly the Kriaz Potemkin, which during the mutiny of June and July last threatened to bombard the city of Odessa. She eventually surrendered to the Roumanian authorities at Kustenji and later was transferred to Admiral Chouknin.

Chouknin has a long record of active service and for a time was believed to be under orders to take to the Far East, which the admiral was advised that the Three Saints had hoisted the red flag, and that the mutineers were forcibly detaining two other ironclads which had refused to join them.

Only recently it was reported that he had been offered the post of Minister of Marine to succeed Admiral Avellan.
