

40,000 JEWS FLEE WARSAW IN FEAR OF A MASSACRE

Others Following Hourly While the City Is in Panic.

MOBS FORCING RIOTS. Only Able-Bodied Men Remain in Jewish Quarter, and These Arm for Fight.

WARSAW, Russian Poland, July 12.—Forty thousand Jews—old men, women and children—fearing massacre, have fled in panic from this city within twenty-four hours, and thousands more are leaving hourly in mad haste to escape the attacks which have been threatened for days.

Only the able-bodied men of the Jewish population remain, and these have organized themselves in defense bands ready to fight for their lives and property when the mobs, as feared, begin their bloody work.

Armed guards have been placed at the gates of all the houses and patrols parade the streets. These have already been submitted to insults by the thugs who are going about in groups eager that their provocations will force the conflict they seek.

All the Jewish stores and dwellings have been closed against the plunderers and that section of the city looks like a place in a state of siege.

Troops and police swarm everywhere, the authorities having taken full precaution against an outbreak, but the elaborate surface preparation evinces no confidence in the people, as they do not trust the Czar's officials.

Following instructions of the police, the newspapers are issuing extra frequently telling the happenings of the hour, this course being adopted in the hope, as given out, of allaying the panic.

But conditions continue to grow worse and the mob is bolder, evidently counting on the sympathy, if not the actual support, of the police in the event of a riot.

PODOLSKA, Russia, July 12.—Hundreds of Jews left this city last night fearing an anti-Jewish outbreak. Today the spirit shops were closed and the authorities have promised to prevent any disturbance.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 12.—Many meetings in the industrial quarter here are scheduled for to-night, and some apprehension is felt that rioting may occur.

HEALYSTOK, Russia, July 12.—The proprietors of eight Jewish factories are presently winning up their affairs, with the intention of removing to Palestine and setting up in business there.

ADMIRAL SHOT BY SAILOR IS DEAD.

REBASTOPOL, July 12.—Vice-Admiral Choukine, commander of the Black Sea fleet, who was shot yesterday by a sailor of the battleship Otschakov, died early to-day without having regained consciousness.

The Admiral was walking in the garden of his villa, where the assassins lay in wait, hidden in a cove of bushes. As the Admiral was passing the sailor shot him, the bullet lodging in a lung. The assassin escaped. It is thought he sought revenge for the putting to death of Lieut. Schmidt, the naval revolutionary leader, by the Emperor.

Admiral Choukine was universally loved by his sailors, and when Schmidt was put to death, March 19, the revolutionaries conspired to murder one hundred of the Admiral's ploughing themselves to carry out the sentence. He had been attacked twice in five months.

RUSSIAN CABINET HAS RESIGNED.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 12.—Finance Minister Kokovsov has given authority for the statement that the resignation of the entire Cabinet is in the hands of the Emperor. So far as can be learned, however, the Czar is not yet ready to charge the Constitutional Democrats with the task of forming a Ministry and is still seeking to compromise the issue by forming a Coalition Cabinet, composed of the right-hand of the Conservative and Liberal elements in the Lower and Upper Houses of Parliament.

Count Haldan, who is the leader of the Constitutional Democrats, is pleading themselves to carry out the sentence. He had been attacked twice in five months.

ICE DEALERS TO WAR ON TRUST

Brooklyn Independents Propose to Save Consumers \$2 a Ton.

There will be a meeting to-night in Prospect Hall, Brooklyn, of the independent ice dealers at which plans for an active campaign against the trust will be decided upon.

The retailers claim that the present exorbitant prices exacted by the trust are forcing many of their number out of business. They claim that the wholesale dealers are in league with the Ice Trust to keep prices as high as possible. They say that with ice at \$5 a ton wholesalers they cannot make a living profit.

It was said last night that the retailers will probably make a deal with the Mutual Ice Company, which has docks at the Wallabout. It is proposed to have the ice shipped from Maine at a cost to the dealer of \$2 a ton. The dealers propose to retail the product at \$4 a ton, a saving to the consumer of \$2 a ton.
