Prisoner's Mother Will Arrive from Europe To-Morrow and Pass Upon Suggested Insanity Defense for White's Slayer.

TENDERLOIN A UNIT IN DECLARING HIM CRAZY.

Trial Is Set for Oct. 1, and Jerome Will Conduct It in Person, Alleging Jealousy and Revenge as Motives for Crime.

Roso Marston, a beautiful young woman, who for years was an intimate friend of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, gave to Assistant District-Attorney Garvan this afternoon information which he thinks will be of the utmost value to the prosecution in the trial of Harry Thaw for the murder of Stanford White.

Miss Marston never knew Stanford White except by reputation, and she does not know Harry Thaw personally. Her testimony has its bearing upon the life and morals of Evelyn Nesbit in the days when she was White's protegee and Thaw's sweetheart.

Miss Marston explains that she is now a real actress. For years, however, she had more than a local fame as an artist's model. It was then that she became friendly with Miss Nesbit, also an artist's model and later a show girl.

Her appearance at the Criminal Courts Building was entirely unexpected, as her name had not at any time been connected with the investigation of the roof garden murder of the events which led to Miss Nesbit's death.

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Thaw's Mother Due To-Morrow. Mrs. William Thaw, mother of the millionaire murderer, will reach New York on her last return from Europe late to-morrow afternoon. The Hamburg-American liner Kaiserin Victoria, from Hamburg, on which Mrs. Thaw is a passenger, has been reported by wireless telegraph 46 miles east of Sandy Hook, and it is figured that she will reach her dock about 4:30 P. M. Saturday.

As soon as the elder Mrs. Thaw has had an opportunity to see her son and his lawyers it is expected that certain vital phases of the campaign of defense.

MRS. STENTON IN TEARS TELLS OF ALICE'S MURDER

Old Woman on Stand at Inquest Suffers Lapse of Memory.

NOROW NIGHT BEFORE.

Lawyer Gibson Declares Mrs. Schippo Perjured Herself on the Stand.

Old Mrs. Stenton was called to the stand this afternoon at the inquest in the Bronx into the murder of her daughter, Mrs. Alice Kinnan. She was weeping when she was sworn by Mr. Wells, one of the court clerks. After taking the oath she settled back in the chair as though tired and ill. She seemed to be hard of hearing, and the questions put to her had to be repeated. She seemed to misunderstand the questions put to her by the coroner. After telling her name, Mrs. Stenton seemed to have a complete lapse of memory. Tears rolled down the old woman's cheeks and she brushed them away with her hand.

As the coroner continued with the examination Mrs. Stenton became more accustomed to the situation and she answered questions more freely. She told the old story of Alice going to the door against her warning.

She said after finding her daughter she sent for the woman downstairs. She said she did not see or hear Mrs. Schippo ask her daughter any questions.

She could not recall the night before the murder that any one called. While the old woman was testifying Gibson was leaning on his elbows and staring hard at the witness. The old woman could not recall that Gibson called at the house on the night before the murder.

She denied that anybody was walking the floor all Thursday night. She said that Gibson brought and sold stock for her. She said she still owned the old property and that Gibson had pretended to sell it to somebody else. She said she had known Gibson five years and that she had always trusted him and thought him honest until lately.

She would not tell what had caused her to lose faith in him. She said that Mrs. Kinnan always talked with Gibson.
