THOUSANDS OF SICKLY BABIES SAVED BY CARE.

Physicians of Evening World Find Pathetic Cases in Tenements.

Green corn, green apples, cucumbers, overripe bananas, "chickie pokoy," sour milk, tea, coffee, beer, corned beef and cabbage, lemon soda, doughnuts!

A fine diet, isn't it? Well, that is what The Evening World corps of physicians, the doctors who are carrying out the work of the Sick Babies' Fund, find in more than half of the tenements they visit being fed to babies under a year of age.

And that is not all. There are feeding-bottles not properly cleaned, bottles with the contents invariably cold, and the baby—well of course the baby is sick. How could it be otherwise? Poor innocent little sufferer from ignorance and carelessness!

The carcasses of the tenements of the poor by the Sick Babies' Fund physicians is one of the most comprehensive crusades against sickness and infant mortality ever launched on this coast.

How the Doctors Work. Everything that can be done to save these pitiful little bits of humanity is done. The sick babies are treated and the mothers are taught how to feed them. The utter recklessness and the real crime of feeding children the poisonous stuff their mothers give them is

told with all its force to those parents who think the first and to a crying child is to stuff it full of more impure food.

If mothers would only keep the babies clean, if they would keep the feeding bottles clean, if they would only feed them at the proper time and not give them their food at irregular intervals, if they would remember that babies in hot summer weather can be brought out into the open air, if they would remember that the rate of infant mortality would be diminished to a wonderful degree if the mother, instead of giving the baby a complaint don't persist in giving milk, but give water in sufficient nourishment until the little creature is well again.
