

WOMAN JAILED BY COURT ERROR FREED AT LAST

Mrs. Peterson Out of Cell, but Prostrated by Terrible Ordeal.

BLUNDER CORRECTED.

Magistrate Cornell Discharged Woman and by Mistake Signed Commitment.

An innocent woman, who had spent twelve days in prison, the victim of judicial red tape—was liberated to-day through the efforts of Daniel O'Reilly, who took up the case at the suggestion of The Evening World. The unfortunate prisoner was Mrs. Agnes Peterson, young and handsome, who was kept in a cell at Jefferson Market after she had been acquitted on a charge of assault. It was through an error on the part of Magistrate Cornell that she was deprived of her liberty, and it was he who signed the paper by which she secured her release.

Mrs. Peterson, who will soon become a mother, lives in West Twenty-sixth street. Her neighbors declare she is most respectable.

On Aug. 27 Mrs. Peterson was charged with assault by Lizzie Cunningham, of No. 24 West Thirty-fifth street. Mrs. Peterson, nervous to the point of hysterics, was haled before the court, and the evidence was heard by Magistrate Cornell. There was nothing to substantiate the charge, and the Magistrate said: "Case dismissed."

Scored Fellow Magistrates. It was a busy day in court for the Magistrate. He was tired, too, for he had just been serving in the place of Magistrate Finn while the latter was at Saratoga taking an occasional flyer with bookmakers and drinking deeply

of healing waters. Magistrate Cornell had some bitter things to say of Magistrate Finn at the time. He also told of having too much work to do.

When Magistrate Finn returned from the Saratoga Springs and race track Magistrate Cornell was forced to take the place of Magistrate Wahle. Magistrate Cornell was also due to go on his vacation, and he was flustered. Bridge Officer John Foley, who knows more about Jefferson Market Court and the prisoners who come before the tribunal than any one else, was also on a vacation.

In the confusion Magistrate Cornell signed a commitment instead of a release and Mrs. Peterson was taken back to the Jefferson Market prison. Acting Warden Dursey believed the woman had been held for examination and she was assigned to a cell.

Suffered Mental Tortures. Mrs. Peterson, knowing nothing of police court ways, kept silent and suffered mental tortures.

Magistrate Cornell then went on his vacation. First he was at Bayside, L. I., and from there he went to New Hampshire. When the error was discovered the acting warden tried to communicate with him. It was necessary for the discharge papers to be signed by the sitting magistrate before the woman could be released. The papers were returned from Bayside, and yesterday they were sent to New Hampshire.

When The Evening World called the attention of the matter to Mr. O'Reilly he was indignant, and after comment upon the outrage said he would swear out a writ of habeas corpus to secure the woman's release. He started for the Supreme Court Building with that end in view, but when he reached the tribunal he was informed that Magistrate Cornell had been reached and that the woman had already been released. She immediately went to her home, but will probably have to go to Bellevue on account of her condition.

BEAT OUT WITH HANDS FIRE IN CHILD'S DRESS.

Mother of Irene Tobin Was Badly Burned—Girl Goes to Hospital.

Irene Tobin, four years old, was playing at a bonfire in front of her home at No. 21 Flint street to-day when her skirts caught fire. Her mother, attracted by her screams, ran from the house, and after a hard fight extinguished the flames with her hands. Irene was so badly burned about the body and head that she was sent to the Brooklyn Hospital. The mother's hands and arms were severely burned, but after they had been dressed by an ambulance surgeon she returned to her home.
