

QUARANTINE A HOUSE AFTER \$9,000 THEFT

All in Weinstein's Home Kept Prisoners by Owner and Police.

HUNT FOR STOLEN GEMS

Disappeared from Bedroom and Are Believed to Be Hidden in Building.

Following the theft of \$9,000 worth of jewels from Emanuel L. Krulwich, a real estate dealer, in the home of his father-in-law Simon Weinstein, No. 16 West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, last night, the house was guarded today by Mr. Weinstein and the police, the former giving instructions that no one was to leave the house and nothing should be sent out until the jewels are found.

Mr. Weinstein invited his daughter and her husband to spend the Jewish holidays at his home, a private house at No. 16 West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, and yesterday afternoon Mrs. Krulwich went to the safe deposit vaults of the Colonial Bank, One Hundred and Sixteenth street and Seventh avenue, and got a case containing her jewels and several pieces belonging to her husband. During the holidays there were to be several parties at the Weinstein home and Mrs. Krulwich intended wearing her gems.

She and her husband reached the Weinstein home early last evening and Mrs. Krulwich put the case containing her jewels on a dressing table in the rear bedroom on the second floor, which had been assigned to her and her husband.

During the evening Mr. Weinstein presented to his son-in-law a ring set with three large diamonds as a token of affection and in celebration of the Jewish feast. It was similar to a ring Mr. Weinstein himself had which Mrs. Krulwich had often admired.

When Mr. and Mrs. Krulwich retired they placed this ring with the other jewels in the case on the dressing-table and left them there during the night.

The jewel case this morning was where it had been left last night and apparently had not been disturbed. Neither Krulwich nor his wife investigated it. After breakfast Mr. Krulwich went downtown and Mrs. Krulwich went to her room to dress. She opened the jewel case to get a gold neck chain and discovered it was empty. Every jewel had been taken. Mrs. Krulwich shrieked and the fall alarmed Mr. Weinstein, who was in his library

under her room. He ran upstairs, and after reviving his daughter learned what was the matter. Nothing else had been taken from the house and nothing else searched for. The thief evidently knew the jewels were in the house and others they were. Mr. Krulwich said the thief had undoubtedly crept into the room while he and his wife were asleep and stolen the gems. The police were inclined to believe the jewels were stolen while the family was at breakfast this morning.

PRISONER HELD FOR \$10,000 ROBBERY.

Identified by Hackman as Having Been Driven to Scene of Burglary in New Canaan.

Joseph Mendocino was held in the Centre Street Police Court by Magistrate Brown today after he had been identified as the man who robbed the residence of a wealthy resident of New Canaan of \$10,000 worth of goods in July last. Mendocino was arrested by Detective Sergeant Grey and saved, who learned of his whereabouts from a man who bought a watch from him and attempted to pawn it. Grey was in the pawn shop and recognized the watch as part of the stolen property.

In court today Mendocino was identified by a Stamford hackman as the man whom, with a companion, he had driven to New Canaan on the night of the robbery.
