

HUGHES IN FIRST MESSAGE STRIKES AT TRANSIT EVILS

Governor Tells Legislature State Railroad Board and Rapid Transit Commission Should Be Wiped Out as Step to Public Relief.

Following the recommendation of Gov. Hughes in his message for relief from overcrowded street and bridge cars, Senator Grady presented a bill in the Senate today providing for the creation of a Public Utilities Commission to replace the State Railroad Board and Rapid Transit Commission.

ALBANY, Jan. 2.—Gov. Hughes' first message, a concise, able and direct document, was read to the Legislature today. It contains many useful recommendations and shows that the Governor has given sharp attention to the needs of the State.

That there be a recount of the vote cast in the Mayoralty election of 1905, that the State adopt a new form of ballot, that a limit be placed upon the amount a candidate may spend in securing his election, that the Board of Railroad Commissioners and the Commission of Gas and Electricity be abolished and a new board formed with increased powers to handle the railroad, gas and electricity corporations.

He also suggests that something be done to relieve the crush at the Brooklyn Bridge and abolish the horse cars; that the Rapid-Transit Commission of New York City be abolished and be replaced by a State Board to handle all railroad conditions within the limits of the greater city; that the labor laws be strengthened, especially those framed for the protection of children, and that measures be taken to relieve the strain upon the Municipal Courts of New York City.

Another form of ballot in New York has given rise to objections which experience in other States has shown to be without weight.

The Governor finds much to commend in the Corrupt Practices Act and suggests that a limitation be placed upon the expenses of candidates. The worst congestion is found at the Brooklyn Bridge, due to the convergence at that point of the Brooklyn traffic. The people of Brooklyn who do business in Manhattan are subjected, morning and night, not only to exasperating inconvenience, but to such maltreatment and indignities incident to their disgraceful herding that relief in the most practical manner should be afforded them at the earliest possible moment.

In some portions of the city antiquated horse cars may be seen, giving picturesque emphasis to the disregard of the public convenience. I recommend that the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners be abolished and that a new board be created to have powers with reference to operations within the territory of Greater New York.

(Special to The Evening World.) WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Jan. 2.—By a decision of Frank V. Willard, referee, as filed in the Supreme Court at White Plains today, Mrs. Jennie Bucklin, of New Rochelle, will be granted a divorce from her husband, Guilford Spencer Bucklin, who now resides in Manhattan.

"My honor," said Kebel, stroking his brown Vandike beard, "I did love Miss Birch with all my heart. I did not know she was married. I had placed her in this position I never want to see her again. My love has died. It is gone forever."

"The important question is not whether Harry K. Thaw is sane," today declared Dr. Charles L. Dana, the noted alienist to an Evening World reporter, at his home, No. 53 West Fifty-third street.

With deliberation Dr. Dana continued, "It is simply this—How far can an insane man go in persisting that he has full possession of his mental faculties?"

Dr. Dana, with Dr. Allan McLane Hamilton, examined the slayer of Stanford White shortly after the Roof Garden tragedy.

"My data is very complete," continued Dr. Dana; "and while the observations were not continued for as great a length of time as I should have desired, they were sufficient to form a basis of a conclusion. It is enough for me to say that I reached a conclusion identical with that of Dr. Hamilton. Further, I do not care to discuss young Mr. Thaw."

Dr. Hamilton says: "Harry K. Thaw is insane and has been insane for years."

With the Thaw trial less than three weeks distant the comments of these famous alienists, retained by former counsel to Thaw, are of deep importance.

The fact is that both Drs. Dana and Hamilton will probably be needed by Thaw's present counsel before the trial is closed, as it is believed that when it is called on Jan. 21 in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court there will be a determined defense set up along one line—insanity.

MAYOR QUESTIONS JACKSON'S POWER

Counsel Likely to Insist That Attorney-General Cannot Take Up Recount Fight.

Mayor McClellan was served with notice this afternoon requiring him to show cause before Attorney-General Jackson in Albany next Monday why quo warranto proceedings should not be instituted to test his right to the office of Mayor of New York City.
