

TESTING POISON CHARGE IN RICH WIDOW'S DEATH

Experts Analyzing the Stomach for the District-Attorney.

NURSE COMPLAINANT.

Mrs. Binge's Doctor Doesn't Credit Accusation that Mercury Was Used.

A charge made by a trained nurse that Mrs. Ida Binge, who died yesterday at her home, No. 88 East Eightieth street, was given slow poison during her last illness, is under investigation by the District-Attorney's office.

AN OPERATION FOR CANCER.

Some time ago Mrs. Binge underwent an operation for cancer at the private hospital of Dr. W. T. Bull at No. 31 East Thirty-first street. When apparently on the road to recovery she was sent to her home and placed in the care of two trained nurses, Dr. Samuel Gluck, of No. 1941 Madison avenue, the family physician, was in charge of the case.

Said Mercury Was Given. The first accusation was made by the nurse last Tuesday.

In company with another woman she said she had seen Mrs. Binge's pills and saw her take them.

The nurse said that during her ministrations in the case of Mrs. Binge some mercury was being given steadily to the sick woman.

Dr. Gluck said a year ago Mrs. Binge had an operation on her eye. Then cancer developed and Dr. Bull performed an operation, but she would refuse to deal and Mrs. Binge had been losing her vitality ever since.

Case Was Hopeless.

"It was known that the case was hopeless, and that the patient could not live long, and as her death was only a matter of weeks, I don't think it probable that any one would have been foolish enough, even if foolish enough, to endeavor to hasten the end. If such a thing was done, I will be much surprised. The patient had no enemies that I know of, and I don't think it probable that a harsh thing about her. Every member of the family is entitled to the greatest respect."

MARINES WITH BAYONETS QUELL 'CRUISER MUTINY'

Outbreak on Tennessee Ends with One Man Killed; Two Wounded.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 7.—Mutiny on the United States cruiser Tennessee, in which three men were shot, one to death, has caused a sensation about the League Island Navy Yard here today. There has been no trouble between the sailors and petty officers ever since the Tennessee took President Roosevelt on his trip to Panama, when the petty officers in their desire to "show off" the sailors, made her aboard the armed cruiser miserable for the men.

It came to a crisis last evening, and Chief Master-at-Arms James Douglas, forty-five years old, is dead, Master-at-Arms William McCool is suffering from a revolver shot in the face and the man, while Harry Burke, twenty-four years old, and one of the mutineers, is shot through the wrist and is a prisoner in the brig. Two other seamen, Dennis and Dean, are in irons as mutineers and more arrests will follow.

Mutiny Is Checked.

The mutiny was checked only when marines were called and with fixed bayonets faced the trouble-makers, who were forced to their quarters. Previous to this the crew had refused to respond to the assembly bugle call sounded by the officers.

The sailors say the petty officers have been mean and overbearing ever since the Presidential voyage. For so good reason men have been bundled into the brig. Chief Master-at-Arms Douglas was thoroughly hated by most of the seamen. Every day he is said to have sent one or more of the men under him to the brig.

Opened Fire.

Chief Master-at-Arms Douglas when Burke opened fire. Three times he shot point blank at Douglas, and then twice more, two bullets striking Douglas in the chest. Both Douglas and Burke were wounded. Douglas was taken to the hospital and Burke was taken to the brig. The men shouted. It was at this time, when a general uprising was imminent, that the marines came.

SULTAN HURRIES AFTER NOTICE BY UNITED STATES

Tired of Delay, Ambassador Goes Direct to Him on American Schools.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 7.—Wearied with the delays so characteristic of Turkish officialdom, the American Ambassador, Mr. Leshman, has suddenly raised the question of the recognition of the American schools into prominence by communicating directly with the Sultan, urging the necessity of a prompt settlement of the question.


