

MEAN BURGLAR STOLE 20¢ FROM BOY'S TOY BANK

Youngster Had Helped Himself Early to Auto Coin.

When John D. Rockefeller gave away \$2,000,000 the other day baby Albert Barry's mother gasped with surprise and turning to her four-year-old offspring, said: "Alby, dear, you must save your pennies until you grow up. Pennies make the dollars, you must learn, and mamma will buy Alby a nice little toy bank, and when the bank is full up to the top we'll take the money to a big bank downtown, and then Alby will have a bank account of his own. Won't that be nice?"

Four-year-old Alby had been a spendthrift since he first learned to hold out his hand for a penny, and while the suggestion to save did not appeal to him, still the new toy bank had its charms when mamma Barry brought it home and showed her cherished little man how it worked. The metallic ring of the coin as it dropped within the maw of the bank was music in Alby's ears at first. Then all the charms of the miniature financial institution paled on Alby suddenly.

He hadn't had a stick of candy since the "blamed old thing" had been brought into the house, and as for candy on a stick, a penny for two, they were as remunerative only. SUN SPOTS FAIL TO DISTURB EARTH

New York Telephones Worked Just as Well as Usual, Despite Phenomenon.

Despite the enormous spots stretching an eighth of the way across the sun, there has been no noticeable effect on the electric wires in and around New York. Prof. Brewster of Allegheny, who predicted electric disturbances on the earth's surface, expected unusual manifestations last night, and as a consequence the telephone, telegraph and fire alarm men were on the lookout all night for phenomena, but were able to detect nothing abnormal. No magnetic storm was either visible or audible. The telegraph and telephone wires worked as usual, and at Fire Headquarters the operators found that everything was normal during the night. That there is still time for some sort of a manifestation of electrical disturbance, however, is conceded by scientists. Often the sun spots occasion alternate surging of the electric currents, and some times aurora borealis and thunder-storms. Usually the effect on the earth is at the time the spots formed and not at the climax, or during the twelve or thirteen days required for it to pass across the sun. To-night another watch will be kept for unusual conditions.

Pretty Ceremony Performed Before Many Guests in Oraton Hall in Newark.



Anchor Line Pier Badly Wrecked When Astoria Ran Into It To-Day



MANY IN PERIL AS LINER HITS PIER

Astoria, of Anchor Line, Crashed Into Shed, Where Sixty Longshoremen Waited.

Maybe it was because the Astoria, of the Anchor Line, was five days overdue that she butted her pier to-day, torn away seventy feet of siding and let the roof slide down like a rotch eye lid. When finally the big liner ship checked her exuberant self one side of the pier shed was winking at a joke that will cost the company about \$5,000 for repair work. The Astoria, with several tons of skillets on her nose and 250 passengers aboard, had a lot of trouble in getting into her dock at Pier 54, North River. Six tugs were helping her when, it is said, the engineer got an order to start and instead of backing sent her ahead at quarter speed. Sixty longshoremen were standing on the upper side of the long, decked-over pier, 400 feet from the shore, and when the Astoria suddenly came straight at them, the roughest jumped every which-a-way just as the bow ripped into the side of the pier. The smash shook the liner and stirred up the passengers who were gathering forward to disembark. But there was no panic because it was all over in a minute or two. For fear some of the longshoremen had been caught under the collapsing roof, Policeman Roach sent in calls for firemen and ambulances. The shippers and miners of Hook and Ladder Companies No. 12 and No. 21 spent an hour turning over the debris, but they found no bodies underneath.
