BOOKIES LOSE THOUSANDS ON WELL-PLAYED JUBILEE

Two-Year-Old, Backed From 15 to 1 to 6 to 1, Wins Easily.

LADY POWELL AT 15 TO 1

Tickle Takes the Bennings Fifth from the Hot Favorite Slickaway.

By Frank W. Thorp. (Special to The Evening World.) BENNING RACE TRACK, April 1. Cold, wintry wind swept full into grand stand at Benning today made the afternoon anything but pleasant to the spectators. Favorite Reidmore badly, and this added to the gloom of the day.

The victory of Jubilee in the race for two-year-olds was probably the feature of the afternoon. Jubilee was backed from 15 to 1 to 6 to 1, ridden by Hadley, and the favorite Glaucus in the stretch and won going away. A lot of money was separated from the bookies on this fellow.

Anna May won the opening event. She was a 2 to 1 chance, with J. Johnson on. W. Miller who would have been an even money chance, backed plenty of takers. Revenue was killed from 11 to 1 to 6 to 1, but could not do better than third. Rose of Dawn, second choice, ran a fair race.

In the second race Lady Powell, a 15 to 1 chance, made a runaway race of it, shooting to the front on the turn and winning easily by two lengths from Beckon, a 20 to 1 shot, who was closing fast at the end.

Merrimac, third, was quoted at 50 to 1 in the betting.

Souvigny took a lead in the fourth and got a fast race, followed by Harry Bay and Frank Somers. Pioneer, the favorite, made no move until the last half mile, when he closed rapidly and, calling Souvigny in the stretch, won easily by three lengths from Souvigny, who beat Frank Somers five lengths.

Tickle Came Away Easily. Tickle and Slickaway raced together in the fifth to the stretch, when Tickle came away easily by two lengths from Slickaway, who beat Campagner a length.

State Will Also Call the Prisoner's Mother in Desperate Effort to Prove that White's Slayer Is Insane.

COURT IS PETITIONED BY JURY FOR EXTRA PAY.

Ask for \$5 a Day Instead of the Customary \$2 and Cite Precedent—Wife Sure Prisoner Will Be Free for Sunday Dinner.

Clifford W. Hartridge, attorney of record for Harry K. Thaw, stated this afternoon to an Evening World reporter that, except on technical grounds, the defense would not object to the proposed action of District-Attorney Jerome in putting Evelyn Nesbit Thaw upon the stand before the Lunacy Commission to-morrow as a witness against her husband's sanity.

"We are not afraid of any testimony that Mrs. Thaw might give," said Mr. Hartridge, "and I do not think that her husband's lawyers will seriously resist any attempt on the part of the prosecution to compel her to answer questions. She has already waived her right to secrecy by taking the stand in the trial, so that if the District-Attorney is permitted to swear her to-morrow, she will be required under the law to make replies to any legal interrogations which he may put her to."

REAR PLATFORM BREAKS OFF AS CAR JOLTS AWAY

Score of Passengers Let Down Into Street by Queer Mishap.
