

HARRIMAN HAS RAGGED ODELL TO FRONT AGAIN His Letter Clears Former "Boss" of Charge of "Throwing" Black. LEADERS TURN TO HIM. Rival Factions of Party in Albany Mail Him Chief, but He's Indifferent.

Special from Staff Correspondent. ALBANY, April 4.—On again, off again, on again. That is the way Albany Republican politicians refer to Mr. Harriman. The little, round, rounder stands better with the "boys" in the Republican organization today than he has for some time. With one sentence he put Odell out of business as a political boss. With half a dozen sentences he has pulled Odell back from abolition and restored him to the top of his former prestige. This has happened to all factions of the G. O. P. ranging in size at the State capital from a leader to a leader.

The rehabilitation of Odell comes unexpectedly and perhaps too late to appease him. Following his desertion by leaders of the second and third rank he got hot under the collar and has not cared a bean whether the organization built up by him contained in business or not. With the appearance of Mr. Harriman's breezy letter, however, there is a change noticeable on every side. Odell, cleared of the responsibility for the turning down of Frank S. Black for the nomination, is regarded in a new light. It is accepted as being to his credit that during all the months his former allies were suspecting him he kept quiet and waited until circumstances justified his conduct and vindicated him. That vindication has come through Mr. Harriman's busy little pen.

Odell himself appears to be utterly unconcerned about it. But there are a lot of fellows who wigged their thumbs at him a few short months ago who are now wiggling their thumbs at him. They are now wiggling their thumbs at him because he has turned the trick that sacrificed Black and made Odell the scapegoat of his party.

The name of the Newburgh boss has been heard more frequently during the past forty days than it has for many months in many months. The last time Odell was heard he was speaking far from the cover of his party, which indicated that he viewed the undertakings of Gov. Higgins with a great deal more favor than was generally believed. Odell is considered a philosopher and a very good loser. He viewed with amusement the efforts of the men who threw him to the wolves to extract from him a confession of guilt of which he warned men at Saratoga last fall, when he frankly predicted that if they did not get together and pick out one of their own kind for Governor they all find themselves in the discard later on.

Now that they are hailing him again as the boss, it is interesting to wonder how simply Odell smiles and wags his head.

Up in Buffalo there is a little organization known as the "Moose Club." County Judge Harry Taylor, Saratoga; Louis Hart and Health Commissioner Wendt are the leading members. Among the guests at a recent meeting was Dr. Gaertner, the president of a combination of German societies that have declared against the local option law. At that same meeting there were present Assemblyman John H. Mallon and Charles F. Brooks. Dr. Gaertner knew that Mr. Mallon was the Assemblyman in his district, but he had never seen him. Mr. Brooks introduced Mr. Mallon to the doctor as Augustus P. Allen, an Assemblyman from Chautauque County. Mr. Allen is strong for local option and does not stand well in the graces of the doctor.

"Up for local option," declared Mallon, "improving Allen, but then I have to tell you I like my beer. I leave Albany every Thursday afternoon to go to get to Jamestown in time for Bible class. You see, I do that so that people will think I'm on the square." By this time Dr. Gaertner was boiling over with indignation. But Mr. Mallon, still impersonating Mr. Allen, continued: "Then, on Sunday I attend services in the morning and Sunday-school at noon. I preach a couple of temperance sermons and run like the devil to catch a train for Buffalo, where I drink beer until Monday morning, when I go back to Albany. How about your own Assemblyman?" "You mean Mallon," said Dr. Gaertner. "Yes," said Mr. Hart. "Oh, he's for local option, but he's pretty much of a lightweight."
