
SAVE GUARD FROM TRAIN.

SEEK HANLON'S BODY IN SHEEPSHEAD BAY

Racing Man Wrote His Wife Monday, "You'll Never See Me Alive Again."

The Brooklyn police were asked today to aid in the search for Fred O. Hanlon, for many years secretary of the Jockey Club, who disappeared from his home in Sheepshead Bay last Saturday.

The friends of the popular racing man who have been searching the waters of Sheepshead Bay in rowboats and launches for the past two days do not expect to see him alive again because of a note his wife received on Monday.

Mrs. Hanlon was entertaining Mrs. Fred Lundy, the wife of Alderman Lundy, when she received a bundle of papers containing her husband's insurance papers and a note on which was written only:

"You will never see me alive again. FRIED."

Mrs. Hanlon fainted and has been confined to her bed in a dangerous hysterical condition ever since.

When Hanlon's many friends in Sheepshead Bay learned of his disappearance and the note received by his wife they began a systematic search for him.

All his old haunts in both New York and Brooklyn were visited, but no one was found who had seen him since Saturday.

This convinced the searchers that he had committed suicide, and the hunt was continued on the pier head of Sheepshead Bay. Diamond Jim Brady taking part in it in a launch hired for the occasion. It is said by Hanlon's friends that he had invested heavily in the poolroom syndicate which met so many reverses.

The young canoeist had not gone a hundred yards from the pier head of the basin when a heavy squall overturned the boat. He sank at once, and his body was not recovered until two hours later.
