The crap-shooting brethren in East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street say that Mistah Jeems Carter is that kind of a fellow for any length of time. Mistah Carter, who is about six hands high and the color of a stick of licorice, broke loose on a Mount Vernon car up in the Bronx this morning, and they certainly did have times. Get a rope!" and "To the stake with the fiend!" and despite the heroic struggle of the three policemen to protect their prisoner, they seized the docile victim and put his supple limbs from limb.

Today in the Westchester Police Court Policeman Shewey arraigned Jeems Carter and with him produced as evidence the weapon which had caused a car stampee and a riot. POLICE HUNT FOR BODY IN THE BAY

Launches Out for Hours, but Without Finding the "Floater."
