BOISE, Idaho, June 7.—The cross-examination of Harry Orchard, leading witness against William D. M'GOWAN, AS MAYOR, VETOES RECOUNT BILL

McClellan Leaves Town So That He May Do the Act Legally.

Acting Mayor McGowan Vetoes the Recount Bill Late This Afternoon.

The bill, he says, is unjust and unfair, is special legislation in the interest of an individual, is retroactive, and "challenges the honesty of about ten thousand citizens," meaning canvassers, poll clerks, etc.

"It is unjust to Mayor McClellan," the Acting Mayor says, "because it does not insist on a full recount, and it is unfair because if any other candidate should petition to open 500 boxes Mayor McClellan would be required to petition to open the rest of the boxes to insure the recount of all the ballots that were counted officially on the evening of Nov. 7, 1905; and only in the case of his being unseated would his expenses be paid by the taxpayers of the city."

In order to give President McGowan of the Board of Aldermen, the legal right, as acting Mayor, to veto the recount bill, Mayor McClellan got out of town this afternoon. He left the City Hall in an automobile, and his destination was very carefully kept secret, although it is said the automobile was headed north, and that it would not stop this side of Yonkers, if it did stop.

The Mayor managed to get away unobserved. He left the City Hall about 2:30 o'clock.
