

COMPETENCY OF SCIENCE LEADER TO BE TESTED

Judge Chamberlain Orders a Master to Examine Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy.

CONCORD, N. H., June 10.—Judge Chamberlain today ordered that Mrs. Mary B. Eddy's competency be determined by a master, in connection with the action brought by relatives, who sue as "next friends," for an accounting of Mrs. Eddy's property.

This order was made in connection with the suit of the "next friends" of the founder of Christian Science for an accounting of her property. The decision to appoint a master was announced at the close of an argument in the Merrimack County Court here after a hearing at which Gen. Frank S. Streeter, in the dual capacity of counsel for Mrs. Eddy and for Mrs. Eddy's three trustees, argued on a motion asking to have the suit brought by the relatives of Mrs. Eddy as "next friends" dismissed on the grounds that the proceedings were not brought in good faith.

Mother Wants to Die Because Son-in-Law and Wife Have Quarrelled.

Grieving because of the marital troubles of her daughter, who had come home to live after a series of quarrels with her husband, Mrs. Pauline Hecht, forty years old, living at No. 87 East Eighty-fifth street, today tried to end her life by gas. She is dying.

TENANTS SMOKED OUT BY FIREBUG

Sets Fire to Old Mattress in Vacant Flat and Emp-ties Building.

An incendiary slipped into a vacant flat on the fourth floor of the tenement house at No. 1373 Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, today, and set fire to an old mattress.

Before the fire was discovered the house was filled with smoke, and the tenants fled to the street in terror. The fire was put out by the firemen, and an investigation was started.

Bond Dealer's Wife Awarded Alimony and Custody of Child. Confirming the findings of Dennis A. McFisay and the interlocutory decree signed by Justice Blanchard, Justice Blahoff today granted a final decree of absolute divorce to June D. Lester from William Lester, dealer in bonds, with an income of \$10,000 a year.

KILLED TRYING TO ENTER FLAT BY DRAIN PIPE

Falls from Roof of Dwelling to Bottom of an Air-shaft.

Thomas Sherlock, a Hudson River steamboat steward, of Rensselaer, N. Y., was found dead today at the bottom of the 8-foot airshaft between Nos. 42 and 44 West Fifty-fourth street. He fell from the roof some two hours after midnight while trying to slide down a drainage pipe to a window in the flat of Mrs. Margaret Jackson on the fourth floor, with whom he boarded.

Sherlock had lived at Mrs. Jackson's at intervals for five years. He took a room with her a week ago and was to have started to work today as a steward on one of the boats of the Cornell Steamboat Line.

With three friends he went on a fishing trip yesterday, returning to the neighborhood of Ninth avenue and Fifty-fourth street about midnight. He started for Mrs. Jackson's flat some two hours later.

She says she heard a rap at her door some time during the night, but paid no attention to it. Sherlock made his way to the roof, and from the fact that part of the pipe running down the airshaft alongside Mrs. Jackson's window was found at the bottom of the shaft, under his body it is assumed that he essayed to slide down and the pipe parted from the support.

He had a sister, Mrs. J. B. Thompson, of No. 1800 First street, Rensselaer. Mrs. Jackson notified her of the accident.

"LAND OF THE FREE" MAY BE "ELLIS ISLAND."

Playwright Accused of Plagiarism Must Defend Production in Court.

Justice Truax decided, in the Supreme Court today, that Max Josephson's contention that Joe Welch had so closely imitated William C. DeMille's play "At Ellis Island" in his own, "The Land of the Free," that there was enough to call for a trial of whether or not he ought not to be stopped from further presentation of the play at the Proctor Theatre.

The affidavits submitted showed that Welch had borrowed the manuscript of DeMille's play from his mother with a view of buying it; that he returned the manuscript and presently appeared in "At Ellis Island," which bore the name of John Edwin, as its author.
