

NO TRACE FOUND OF OWENS'S CHILDREN

Mother Thinks That They May Have Wandered Away Together to the Country.

The disappearance of the two children of Frederick Owens, of No. 119 West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, remains a mystery.

The Owens occupy an old-fashioned two-story frame cottage sitting back in a deep yard. Surrounding it are tall apartment houses. The family has had little communication with the neighbors. The two children, Elizabeth, twelve years old, and Frank, nine, have never been allowed to play with other girls and boys, it is said. Rarely were they seen out of the yard, which has a garden, littered with boxes, barrels and rubbish.

Owens told the police of the West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Station that his son disappeared on Sunday. He had been playing in the yard, and when his mother went out to call him for dinner he was gone. The father went to the police station to give the alarm, taking with him his daughter.

On the way home the girl slipped away. Owens had stopped at One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street and Lenox avenue to tell a policeman of his missing boy. Elizabeth had been following closely behind him. When the father looked around for her after leaving the policeman she was gone. The street was crowded at the time.

Detectives Murphy and O'Connor have failed to find any trace of the children. It is thought Elizabeth joined her brother and that both are now concealing themselves somewhere in the outskirts of the city.

"I don't know where the children are," said Mrs. Owens yesterday, "but I am sure they will come back. I think they are together somewhere and may have wandered off into the country. Elizabeth was very fond of her brother and she may have gone to try to find him. She had been studying very hard lately and complained of headaches."

Mr. Owens spent the whole day searching for the children.

JOCKEY REIFF GETS \$25,000 FROM CROKER

LONDON, June 11.—Johnny Reiff, the American jockey who piloted Richard Croker's three-year-old colt Orby under the wire a winner in the rich Epsom Downs Derby last week, is the hero of the hour. The crack little jockey is being lionized. The former Tammany leader has not forgotten his little jockey either, for he presented him with a check for \$25,000, which is \$25,000 in American money.

He could well afford this, for outside the stake, \$25,000, Mr. Croker undoubtedly won personally fully \$250,000, and the friends who shared his confidence in Orby must have taken many times that amount from the bookmakers.

The British turf officials are determined to do everything possible to exclude Richard Croker from the country. Mr. Croker withdrew Orby's entry at last for the Royal Hunt Cup because the handicap was reduced to a weight of 12 pounds, not giving the horse a ghost of a chance to win. The weight is unprecedented in the history of the race. The action of the officials has caused irritation here. At the next meeting of the corporation of Dublin a motion will be discussed to confer the freedom of the city on Mr. Croker.

CARUSO NOT WORRIED BY EXCLUSION TALK.

"I Shall Snap My Fingers, Return to Europe, and Draw My Salary," He Says.

LONDON, June 11.—Caruso, the tenor, in an interview to-day regarding his possible exclusion from the United States as the result of his police court conviction in New York, said:

"I am sure that I shall be able to return. I shall snap my fingers at the Government's decision if they will not let me land, and I shall merely return to Europe and draw my salary all the same."

SUES DENTIST FOR CALVE COMMISSION.

Miss Joan Udon, a masseuse, is suing Dr. A. W. Harlan, millionaire dentist, of No. 37 Fifth avenue, for profits Dr. Harlan is alleged to have made through treating Miss Calve, the singer.

Miss Udon alleged in her complaint that Dr. Harlan asked her to get Miss Calve for him to treat and that she did so with the understanding that she was to be paid for her services. She avers that Dr. Harlan presented a bill to the singer for \$50 and now repudiates the agreement with her.

HORSE AND CART IN RIVER.

A coal cart and horse belonging to Garrett & Co., of No. 52 West Twenty-fourth street, were lost in the North River at Thirtieth street to-day. A new driver named Lamb, who had just commenced work, was sent to the dock to get a load of coal from a barge on the south side of the pier. He could not manage his horse in backing up to the loading place and went to the horse's head and tried in that way to back him properly. As a result the cart was backed over an electric stanchion into the river, pulling the horse in with it. At last rescuers both were resting on the bottom of the slip. Lamb fled.

JAPS APPRECIATE RUSSIAN SYMPHONY

Kaltenborn Plays Tschaiikowsky's "Pathetique" Before a Distinguished Audience.

THERE was a surprise for the large audience at the St. Nicholas Garden last night when Franz Kaltenborn gave the first symphony concert of his summer season. A beginning had scarcely been made when in walked G. Koike, Consul General, and E. Suzuki, Vice Consul of Japan, together with several other Japanese officials and their wives.

In their honor the Japanese National Anthem, the Marseillaise and America were played to emphasize the close relationship between Japan, France, England and the United States. As the symphony was by a Russian and the Japanese showed a most attentive interest in the playing of it, the occasion was made memorable.

Tschaiikowsky's "Pathetique" was the symphony which Mr. Kaltenborn conducted with evident appreciation, and which his men played with individual excellence. Yet the inspiring note was lacking. With the memory still fresh of the marvelous effects achieved by Salome when he led the Philharmonic Orchestra through this superb work last winter, Mr. Kaltenborn's performance was disappointing. His reading lacked variety. More emphasis and accentuation were needed. There was not enough light and shade. The four movements were taken on too even a plane. The whole work was hurried. Nevertheless, the appreciation of the audience was marked.

In the miscellaneous programme, which preceded the symphony, Leopold Winkler played the piano part in Liszt's Hungarian Fantasia and was vociferously applauded.
