

WOMAN SEES TRIO OF THUGS MURDER VICTIM

Policeman Fires Shot in Chase After Robbers and Succeeds in Capturing One.

DIES WITHOUT SPEAKING

August Meyer Gave His Assaults Blow for Blow Until Skull Was Fractured.

Three highwaymen attacked August Meyer, a brewer's engineer, early today at a thickly populated corner in Williamsburg and beat him to the earth with blows of a slungshot because he resisted them. A woman from a nearby house near by looked on helplessly to help the gritty German. He died five hours later at the Eastern District Hospital without ever speaking.

Meyer was rushed to the Eastern District Hospital, where the surgeons found he suffered from concussion of the brain and a fracture of the skull. They said he would probably die before regaining consciousness, and their prediction proved true.

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GIANT LINER NOW IN THIS PORT IS A FLOATING CITY

President Lincoln, First of the President Steamships, Completes Maiden Trip.

The new giant liner of the Hamburg-American line, the President Lincoln, arrived here to-day on her maiden voyage, which occupied 15 days, 15 hours and 32 minutes from Plymouth. She carried 22 saloons, 14 second cabin, 2nd third class and 250 steerage passengers, also a crew of 300.

The President Lincoln is a 22,000-ton steamship, and of a radically different type from any vessel in the service. She was built to carry a vast number of passengers in comfort, if not with luxuries. Likewise she is the first steamship in the transatlantic service provided with accommodations for four classes of passengers.

The interior of the great liner, so magnificently appointed her smoking room is the most lavishly furnished and decorated of any room of her kind in any ship afloat.

The six masts of the President Lincoln make her look almost a fleet of ships. She does not need the masts for the purpose of propulsion, and they carry no canvas. They are of great help as derricks to load and unload cargo.

The first of the president ships of the German line is 515 feet long and her passengers may get aboard her anything that he can obtain at the best hotels and more. She has a gymnasium and a special room for electric baths and massage. Her sister ship, the President Grant, will make her first overseas trip in September.

TUG RESCUES MEN MISSING FROM NAVY

NORFOLK, Va., June 13.—The two members of the crew of the torpedo boat destroyer Madcox who left Newport News late Tuesday afternoon for the Warden, after having had trouble with the engine of their small boat, and who were reported as missing, arrived safely in port late yesterday after a rough and trying experience resulting from further trouble with the engine of their boat, which drifted about in Hampton Roads, finally carrying the men aground on the western shores of the Elizabeth River.
