

TRIED SUICIDE, THEN MET WITH MANY MISHAPS

Ambulance Axle Broke, Horse Ran Away, After Cusic Cut His Throat.

If Philip Cusic, of No. 30 Franklin street, Williamsburg, survives his attempt at suicide today he ought to be willing to live for the rest of his life. A bad beginning he made in the way of ending his existence was made almost successful by a combination of accidents, including a startling runaway by the horse attached to the ambulance in which he was being conveyed to a hospital.

Cusic is sixty years old. He cut his throat with a sharp razor at his home and then called for help. To the members of his family who responded to his call he said he wanted a priest and a doctor. Father Dillon, of St. Anthony's Church, was sent for, and was doing the best he could for Cusic in a spiritual way when Dr. Snyder and Knapp arrived in an ambulance from the Eastern District Hospital.

They packed the wound in his throat with gauze, wrapped it with bandages and hustled Cusic into the ambulance. Father Dillon at the request of Cusic climbed into the vehicle to ride to the hospital and the two doctors perched on the rear seat.

At North Fourteenth street and Kent avenue the front axle of the ambulance broke. Harry Cleman, the driver, was thrown half way across the street, alighting on his head, and Dr. Knapp was also hurled from the vehicle. Cusic, Father Dillon and Dr. Snyder were pitched in a heap at the front of the ambulance.

The horse ran away and had covered two blocks before Dr. Snyder could climb out on his back, get hold of the reins and stop him. In the ensuing ground incident to the runaway the bandages and packing slipped out of Cusic's wound and he was in danger of bleeding to death.

Dr. Knapp and the ambulance surgeon, while painfully hurt, were able to follow the ambulance and helped Dr. Snyder do some emergency work upon Cusic's throat. In the meantime a call was sent to the German Hospital and Cusic was finally deposited there without further mishap. He has an even chance for recovery.

MEDICINE MAN NEVER KISSED MRS. SILLECK

Howes Says So with a Scowl, Although He Asked Her to Celebrate with Him.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 19.—There were many laughs during the testimony given today before Supreme Court Justice Tompkins in the trial of the divorce action brought by J. W. Silleck, of Peekskill, against his wife, Mrs. Addie Silleck.

Judge Lent, as counsel for Mr. Silleck, called among other witnesses a Mrs. Donaldson, a detective, who said she posed as a manufacturer and gained admittance into Mrs. Silleck's home for the purpose of securing evidence. She said she saw one day two colored men enter and that Mrs. Silleck cut a watermelon for them. She called them "Pete" and "John." The witness said Mrs. Silleck frequently talked about her husband to the negroes.

The detective added that she had seen a man named Donaldson at Mrs. Silleck's house, and that the defendant called him "Will," while he called her "Addie." Judge Lent put J. L. Howes, a patent medicine manufacturer through a grueling cross-examination because of a letter he had written to Mrs. Silleck after she had secured a separation from her husband, four years ago, and in which he addressed her as "Dear Mrs. Silleck."

In answer to a question, Mr. Howes said that the letter was simply a business epistle, and that he had written to other customers congratulating them in the same vein.

"Did you ever kiss Mrs. Silleck?" Judge Lent asked.
"No, I never did," said Mr. Howes, and he scowled deeply.
Mr. Silleck, who is one of the wealthiest residents of Peekskill, names three correspondents in his suit.

STOKES TO FORCE DICKINSON OUT

TRENTON, N. J., June 19.—Gov. Stokes today sent a formal letter to Secretary of State Dickinson requesting him to resign his office. The contents of the missive were not disclosed.

but it is understood that if Col. Dickinson does not respond, the letter will be made public to-morrow.
Col. Dickinson is not disposed to discuss the matter, and does not even admit that he has received a letter from the Governor. The communication, however, was delivered to Col. Dickinson in person by the Governor's private secretary.
Gov. Stokes yesterday personally re-

quested Dickinson to resign, but the latter refused. The Executive, it is understood, told Dickinson that his withdrawal of the Red suit against Mayor Pagan, of Jersey City, was regarded by the public as a virtual admission of Pagan's charges against his (Dickinson's) private life. It was necessary, the Governor said, that in view of this, Col. Dickinson should get out.
The Colonel warmly retorted that the State House was the only person in the State House who wanted him to resign, and he declared he would not do so.
