MURPHY CHECKED, BOYGRANCE'S FACING CRISIS

Government Is Attacked in Chamber of Deputies as Troops Surrender.

PARIS, June 21.—The Government was interpellated in the Chamber of Deputies today on the measures which it proposed to take in order to restore order in the south. Premier Clemenceau in the course of his reply said that over one hundred soldiers were wounded in the fighting. He then fully confirmed the despatches of the Associated Press in regard to the mutiny of a battalion of the Seventeenth Infantry at Arde and its march to Beziers, and said he could not listen to any proposition for the conditional surrender of the mutineers. He also told of the subsequent surrender of the mutineers and their return to the regiment. The Premier concluded with demanding a vote of confidence.
