

AKOI DEcries WAR AND YAMAMOTO TALKS FOR PEACE

Japanese Ambassador and Admiral Make Public Conciliation.

JINGOISM IS TO BLAME.

Mikado's Naval Chieftain Visits Navy-Yard and Lunches with High Officers.

There is no Japanese-American situation, said Viscount Aoki, Japanese Ambassador to the United States, today at the Hotel Astor.

There exists between the two governments no difference of feeling of whatever sort, continued the distinguished diplomat.

There is not the slightest cause for anxiety in the American-Japanese relations, and if there is any it is not because of the actual existence of any difficulty between the two countries.

Yamamoto Looks at Our Ships. Greetings were exchanged between Admiral Aoki and Admiral Yamamoto before the latter left the Holland House with his retinue for a visit at the New York Navy-Yard.

The party was met at the foot of East Twenty-third street by Henderson, aide to Rear-Admiral Goodrich, commander at the Navy-Yard.

In the Navy-Yard they were shown about by experts on a thorough trip of inspection. They took more than a passing look at the great Connecticut.

All of the Japanese are in official character, the visit not being of an official character.

LANTRY WASN'T TURNED DOWN BY MURPHY

Story of Tammany Executive Committee's Action Last Night Absolutely False.

When Mr. Murphy was seen at Tammany Hall to-day he said: "The whole thing is absurd on the face of it. I do not understand how such a yarn could have been concocted."

POLICE GET NEWS OF A ROBBERY BY WAY OF HOSPITAL

Didn't Know That Charles Alsten Had Been Attacked by Highwaymen.

The police of the West Forty-seventh street station were surprised to learn to-day that the man found senseless and bleeding from a deep stab wound in the back at Seventh avenue and Forty-third street had been assaulted and robbed by highwaymen at the junction of Eighth avenue and Forty-second street.

They got this report from Roosevelt Hospital, where the man was taken unconscious, his pockets empty and turned inside out.

Alsten had dined after the theatre last night and started for home in the direction of the Ninth avenue "L" crossing at Forty-second street.

He lay there several hours, he thought, before he was found by a policeman who found him near the report of the fact that he had been stabbed.

Haywood was called to the stand to testify in his own defense this afternoon. The prisoner was perfectly cool as his name was called and he took the witness-chair and began his testimony.

Haywood was preceded on the stand by C. H. Moyer, President of Western Federation of Miners, who was put on the grill by Senator Borah, cross-examining for the prosecution.

An important statement of the witness was a denial of any knowledge of the draft for \$100 sent to Jack Simpkins nine days before Steuneberg was killed.
